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American Diets To Remain Good Outlook Reveals

Oregon homemakers may have to juggle their food items a bit more than formerly under the new ration restrictions, but as far as total food supplies are concerned, the outlook is favorable throughout 1945, reports Miss Lois A. Lutz, extension specialist in home management at Oregon State college. Miss Lutz represented Oregon at the national outlook conference in December, where sessions were devoted for the first time to the outlook for family living.

People in the United States have been unique in having better diets in wartime than in prewar years as a result of higher incomes, record wartime food crops, and increased production of protective foods such as milk, eggs, fruits, and vegetables. The quality of the American diet has improved considerably in the past 25 years, according to records of the U. S. department of agriculture.

Increased milk consumption has meant more calcium, riboflavin, and vitamin A, while greatly increased citrus fruit consumption has added more vitamin C. Victory garden harvests have improved nutrition, with more green and yellow vegetables, which had their value by being consumed fresh out of the garden.

Enrichment of white bread and flour estimated to have increased thiamin in the national diet by one-fourth, iron and niacin by one-fifth, and riboflavin one-seventh. A bill is before the Oregon legislature to make enrichment of white flour compulsory under state law.

An expected 5 to 10 per cent decrease in meat supplies, and of pork in particular, will mean slightly less animal protein and some other food elements, although as far as rationing is concerned many of the most nutritious parts of meat animals are still unrationed, points out Miss Lucy Case, extension nutritionist at O. S. C.

Homemakers can expect approximately the same total amount of milk and milk products in 1945. Total fruit and vegetable supplies may be down slightly but most Oregon families can assure themselves of plenty by having good victory gardens again.

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Revised Bulletin Out Branding of Turkeys

A revised edition of a former bulletin entitled "Management of Turkey Breeding Stock," by Noel L. Bennion, extension poultryman, has just been issued by the O. S. C. Extension service as bulletin No. 644. The new bulletin is somewhat larger than the old, contains more illustrations, and has some new data and reports on newer methods.

Oregon turkey growers normally keep from 300,000 to 325,000 turkey breeders, which produce more than six million poults. Only about one-third of these poults are brooded on Oregon farms, while two-thirds are exported as poults or hatching eggs to various parts of the United States, says Bennion.

Oregon-bred poults and hatchlings are in widespread demand because this is a leading state in the development and production of the broad-breasted bronze type turkeys, Bennion adds. Some producers now are trapnesting, pedigree hatching, and using family performance records in their program of turkey flock improvement.

Christmas Seal Sale Returns 56 Percent Over That of 1943

Returns from the annual Christmas seal sale campaign in South Lane county indicate the total amount collected to date will show better than a fifty six percent gain over last year, Stewart Carlson, district chairman, announced this week. Returns from the district have passed \$1,032.00 as compared with \$660.32 received last year. County returns show a gain of about 22 percent over last year. DOUGLAS LOG TRUCKERS ORGANIZE

The Douglas county truckers' association was organized at Roseburg last week to work with other similar county groups in Lane and Linn counties in an effort to secure relief from current methods of weights and measures on truck loads, particularly log trucks. Truckers declare that existing regulations are forcing truckers to operate 25 percent under capacity, thus reducing the volume of timber which would be available to the mills.

Hotter Than Sun
