New Sallman Painting Depicts Theme of Crusade for Christ



CHICAGO — Warner Sallman, whose portrait of Christ has sold 4,500,000 copies, depicts here the support of millions of Christians to the determination of their Leader that there be no more war. Methodists are among those who are working for liberty and justice for all men, through their four-year, five-fold Crusade for Christ.

Posters of the Sallman painting, now appearing in more than 41,000 Methodist churches across the nation, appeal for sacrificial contributions to the \$25,000,000 Crusade relief and reconstruction fund, more than half of which will go for food, clothing and other aid for peoples of war devastated and occupied countries. Other phases of the Crusade for Christ call for support of co-operation among nations in the post-war world, renewed evangelism efforts, education for Christian stewardship and improvement of Sunday school attendance.

Of the \$25,000,000 for relief and reconstruction when the war is over, which is now being raised by members of The Methodist Church in the Crusade for Christ, more than half will be spent in war devastated areas for food, clothing, medical supplies, and spiritual ministry, according to Bishop J. Ralph Magee of Chicago, director of the four-year program.

Millions of dollars will be spent in China alone under the direction of the Foreign Missions Division of the church, with large amounts also going to war-torn European countries, the Philippines, Burma, Malaysia, Korea and Japan. Emergency missionary work also will be provided in India, Africa and Latin America. Another appropriation will give scholarships to leading nationals of several countries for attending American colleges.

Because specific needs are not now known in most war devastated and occupied countries, exact appropriations in each case will be determined by surveys to be made after the war, Bishop Magee explained. If destruction has not been as great as expected in one country and greater in another, funds will be shifted to meet the greatest need.

On the home front, Methodism's Crusade fund will provide for educational work, home missions and church extension. Additional church workers and religious buildings in war industrial cities, in needy rural areas, and among Negroes, Mexicans and other special groups will be made possible from the home missions and church extension allotment. Appropriations will provide aid to many Methodist schools and colleges, scholarships for students in theological seminaries, and programs for building Sunday school attendance.

Work among the more than 1,500 chaplains of the denomination will be helped from a Crusade appropriation. The American Bible Society, the World Council of Churches and a Methodist Bureau of Research also will be given support.

All Crusade for Christ money will be used for emergency, war-caused needs at home and abroad, Bishop Magee said. None will be spent for the regular program of the church, nor for recurring expenses in new programs.

London

brought to the floor of the House by the military affairs committee. The bill was a disappointment. It was not strong enough to satisfy those who have believed, since the attack on Pearl Harbor, that labor should be mobilized. It contained enough of the so-called labor conscription feature to arouse opposition by all organized labor. It is also opposed by industry.

I have listened to most of the debate and re-checked the points made both for and against the bill. Apparently, the principal arguments for the bill are that, (1) the armed forces approve of it, and, (2) that its passage is needed as a gesture to the man in service, indicating the solid backing of the home front at this critical time in the war.

Numerous arguments in opposition to the bill included: (1) It is unnecessary because production quotas are being met; (2) its passage will not produce any tangible results in increased manpower; (3) it is too late in the war efforts to be of any value; (4) it would provide benefits to civilian workers in addition to wages that are generally deemed to have fully compensated such workers; and, (5) men would be drafted by law to labor for the profit of employers.

These are but a few of a long list of rather compelling arguments against the bill.

MORE ALCOHOL NEEDED. The War Production Board informed me last week that the requirements for industrial alcohol have been substantially increased over previous estimates made for the year 1945. This is of particular interest to our Congressional District for the reason that the first plant ever built in America to produce alcohol from sawdust is now under construction at Springfield, Oregon.

The new estimate of requirements proves conclusively that the WPB decision to build this plant was right. In view of the fact that additional alcohol cannot be obtained from grain and cannot be obtained from petroleum without the curtailment of other needed products from that source, it may be necessary later to expand the facilities for producing alcohol from wood waste. It is generally believed, however, that the plant now under construction, which is expected to be in operation by the middle of this year, will be completed and tested before any new plants are considered.

The requirements set up for 1943 were 428,000,000 gallons, and for 1944, 609,000,000 gallons. Production of alcohol during the year 1945 is estimated at 603,000,000 gallons. Unless production is increased during the year, the present government stock of 81,000,000 gallons will be reduced to 29,000,000 gallons by the end of the year.
