Church Activities

We cannot afford and we do not want another war. We can have permanent peace if we are willing to pay the price for it. What is the price? Do "WE THE PEOPLE" who govern in a democracy know? Come out to these meetings and be informed and thus help the cause of permanent peace.

Capt. Rawls Speaks

Capt. Rawls, who is addressing Oregon high schools on the importance of pre-induction education, spoke to the high school student body February 1.

The point stressed most in his talk was that the best thing that a boy or girl could do to help the war effort was to stay in school and obtain a good education.

For boys, he said, the best pre-induction courses are: chemistry, mathematics, communications, map-reading, shop and history. He urged girls to train for nurses as soon as they finished high school.

To enter services as soon as they finished school, and to get the best education possible is the best way for young people to help their country, Captain Rawls said.

The advanced classes of home economics and agriculture attended a demonstration of farm labor saving devices and step saving devices for the kitchen held in Eugene February 6, at the Lane county fairgrounds.

The students were accompanied by Miss Dorothea Smith, home economics instructor and Donald Kabler, agriculture advisor. Approximately 45 students attended.

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Emergency Crop Loans Available

1944 farm production was the highest in our nation's history and this contributed greatly toward our success in prosecuting the war. The food requirements in 1945 will equal or surpass those of the past year. Decreased manpower on the farm will call forth even greater effort by every farmer if food and livestock quotas are to be met. The small operator, who can carry on his operations with a minimum of help and equipment is being especially urged to produce to his fullest capacity.

The Emergency Crop & Feed Loan section of the Farm Credit Administration is anxious to assist in the food program through its loan service, according to V. N. Freeman, field supervisor for southwestern Oregon. Emergency Crop & Feed loans are made for the purpose of buying seed, fertilizer, and to meet other expenses incident to production including repairs to machinery and equipment. Funds may be used for the purchase or raising of feed for livestock. Security for these loans is a first mortgage on the crops to be financed or the livestock to be fed. The maximum amount of any individual loan is \$400 and the rate of interest is 4 percent per annum. Loan checks are usually delivered within 10 days after the application is completed. "The fact that an applicant owes balances on old crop or feed loans will not in itself prevent approval of a new loan, provided the reason for non-payment was beyond his control," Mr. Freeman said.

Mrs. Sophia Jones Dies Here Saturday
