

Screen Treat Due In "Going My Way"

Promising the finest entertainment to yet reach the screen this year, Paramount's "Going My Way," arriving February 11th at the Arcade Theatre, has already been hailed by critics as a truly great motion picture.

Reviewers gave many reasons for their high praise of this heart-warming and tenderly-drawn movie in which Bing Crosby plays Father "Chuck" O'Malley. The cast of film favorites certainly is an outstanding asset for "Going My Way." Seen in splendid characterization are Barry Fitzgerald, as Father Fitzgibbon; Rise Stevens, a life-long friend of Bing's and now an opera singer;

Frank McHugh, as Father O'Dowd, a school-mate of Crosby's; Gene Lockhart, cautious banker; James Brown and Jean Heather, romance love couple and Porter Hall, neighborhood crank.

Many other roles are handled capably, too, it is said, by such sterling performers as Fortunio Bonanova, Carl "Alfalfa" Switzer and Stanley "Stash" Clements, a pair of young rowdies who are converted to gentlemen under Bing's ministrations, and Eilly Malyon. An altogether delightful story, "Going My Way" seems headed for top Academy Award honors at this writing with Bing and Barry slated for laurels, too.

The Robert Mitchell boys' choir teams with Bing and Rise on several occasions resulting in some extra fine vocalizing, according to reports. The appealing movie was produced and directed by Leo McCarey with B. G. DeSylva as executive producer. Frank Butler and Frank Cavett wrote the screen play.

Wac Platoons Are Now Badly Needed

PORTLAND.—Faced with a serious shortage of trained medical department personnel in army hospitals, the Women's Army Corps Oregon Recruiting headquarters this week was ready to launch a campaign to recruit platoons of Wacs for assignment duty at nine army general hospitals within the ninth service command.

Under the new medical department WAC program, enlistees will receive basic training at Ft. Oglethorpe, Georgia, if they enroll for duty at a specific hospital, and will be eligible, if selected for free training after their basic training at an army medical or surgical technician school. Those who enroll for general assignment as medical department Wacs will be sent to Ft. Des Moines, Iowa, for basic training, Capt. R. L. Gantenbein, commanding officer of the Oregon WAC recruiting district announced.

"So urgent is the need for this additional trained medical personnel to help the more than 30,000 wounded fighting men being returned to this country every month, that the Oregon district is attempting to enlist a platoon, consisting of 15 Wacs, from each sizeable town in the state," Capt. Gantenbein said.

Hospitals for which enlistees are being accepted for duty from Oregon include: Birmingham General Hospital, Van Nuys, Calif.; De Witt, Auburn, Calif.; Dibble, Palo Alto, Calif.; Hammond, Modesto, Calif.; Letterman, San Francisco, Calif.; Torrey, Palm Springs, Calif.; Madigan, Fort Lewis, Wash.; Bushnell, Bringham City, Utah; and Baxter, Spokane, Wash.

Full details about the new program are available at the WAC Recruiting Station, Post Office Bldg., in Eugene, Oregon.

Feb. 13 Anniversary Of Women Marines

On February 13, the Marine Corps Women's Reserve will celebrate its second anniversary with business as usual. No fanfare will mark the day as 19,000 women quietly carry out the duties for which they were enlisted—the duties of freeing combat-trained Marines to fight.

In Portland, Major Norris E. Lineweaver, Marine recruiting officer for Oregon and Southern Washington, was also permitted to announce this week that once again applicants are being sought for enlistment in the Marine Corps Women's Reserve. Eligible ladies between 20 and 36 years of age may write him, care of 208 New U. S. Courthouse, Portland, for information.

From coast to coast, according to the major, women Marines are at their desks, their teletype machines, their lathes, in their repair shops, control towers, and hangars, doing the jobs they were trained to do, whether it be checking a hydraulic or filing system. To new places they're now

taking that job. For only three weeks ago the first contingent of women Marines arrived in Pearl Harbor—the vanguard of over a thousand to follow. They want more to enlist and help shorten a long war.

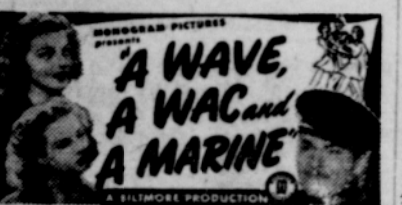

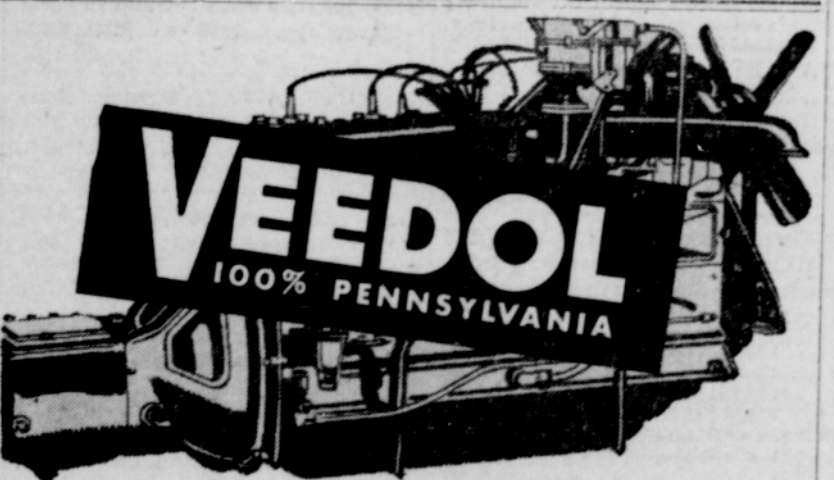

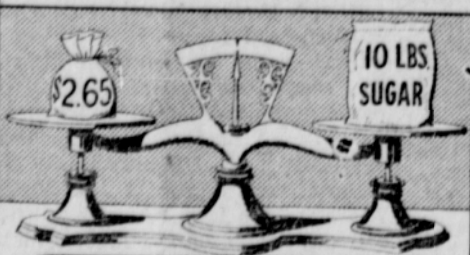

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Baking tips for good eating...

RICH BISCUIT DOUGH
For rolls and coffee cakes
2 cups all-purpose flour
3 tps. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
6 tps. shortening
1 egg
Milk

Sift flour; measure; and sift again with baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening until it is as fine as corn meal. Break egg into measuring cup; beat with fork; and add enough milk to make 1/2 cup liquid. Add to flour mixture; stir with fork until all of flour is dampened. Turn out on lightly floured board.

This basic dough is suitable for almost every imaginable type of roll or coffee cake. For example:

CINNAMON NUT ROLLS
Use Rich Biscuit Dough Above.
Roll dough 1/4 inch thick; spread with 2 tablespoons softened butter and sprinkle with 2 teaspoons cinnamon and 1/4 cup sugar. Roll up as jelly roll and cut in 1/2 inch slices. Sprinkle a few coarsely chopped nuts in the bottom of a well-greased muffin or square pan; place rolls on top. Bake in moderately hot oven (425 F.) for about 15 minutes.

BEAR CLAWS
Use Rich Biscuit Dough Above.
Roll dough 1/4 inch thick; sprinkle with 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 1 tablespoon flour mixed with 1 teaspoon cinnamon, and 1/2 cup seedless raisins. Roll up as for jelly roll; cut in 2 inch pieces, flatten out. Slash one folded edge at inch intervals to within 1/2 inch opposite side using scissors. Place on baking pan. Bake in moderately hot oven (425 F.) for about 15 minutes.
