

Platoon of Women Is County Goal

Lane county has set out to enlist a complete platoon of women to serve with the medical department of the army in helping to care for the thousands of soldiers who are being returned to this country for treatment each week. These women, enlisting in the Women's Army Corps for training and duty in hospital units, will have the opportunity of remaining together throughout their basic and technical training at Fort

Oglethorpe, Georgia. Lt. Elsie K. Nedrow, officer in charge of WAC recruiting in Lane county, announced that all women between the ages of 20 and 50 may be eligible to join the county's special platoon since no previous hospital or medical training is required. All those who meet the standards for enlistment in the Women's Army Corps are eligible to join in the important work of caring for our battle-torn heroes, and will be trained by the medical department in special courses for medical and surgical technicians, L. J. Nedrow announced. A few of the enlistees will be trained to take over special assignments in the field of hospital administration.

Governor Earl Snell, in recognizing the critical need for additional Army hospital personnel, has directed all state agencies, including the Office of Civilian Defense, to aid in the procurement of Medical Department Wacs. At the same time, the state senate and house of representatives passed a concurrent resolution adding their support to the recruiting effort in Oregon.
