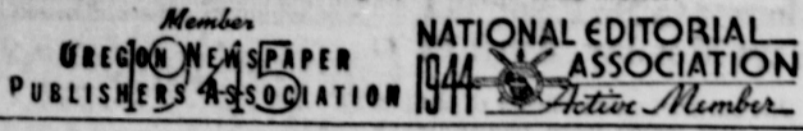

Tanks Give Lesson: American tanks are giving the railroads a few lessons that will greatly improve postwar transportation. Introduction of triple-acting hydraulic shock absorbers on tanks proved so effective in easing jolts and improving gun accuracy that today every new tank has them. By cushioning the shock of riding over rough terrain, they keep the chassis level and help keep the guns directed at the target.

Eight-point Dairy Program is Recommended for This State

A well-balanced dairy program with regard to feed supplies, labor availability, and the longtime future of the dairy enterprise is the objective of the national eight-point dairy program now advocated throughout the United States, says Harold Ewalt, assistant dairy extension specialist at Oregon State college. The program, sponsored by the U. S. department of agriculture, the War Food administration, and the state Extension services, applies equally to the state of Oregon as elsewhere, Ewalt declares. As in previous years, the eight points are aimed toward bringing about maximum production for wartime demand, while recognizing the need for a good balance looking toward postwar conditions. The eight points included in the program follow: 1. Grow an abundance of high quality roughage. 2. Balance your herd with your feed supply. 3. Keep production records on each cow in your herd. 4. Practice disease-control methods. 5. Produce milk and cream of the highest quality. 6. Adopt labor-saving methods. 7. Take care of your land. 8. Develop a sound breeding program.

A. A. A. Phosphate Price in Oregon Set at \$34 per Ton

The cost of AAA superphosphate distributed under the 1945 conservation materials program will be \$34 per ton, county agricultural conservation associations were notified this week by the state AAA committee. Against this \$34 cost farmers receive a credit of \$24 a ton for applying the phosphate to legumes, grasses, permanent pastures and cover crops in orchards. The amount of phosphate that a farmer can obtain under the program is limited by his farm allowance, which is the sum of \$2 times the acres of cropland and orchard in the farm. To assist in meeting the urgent need for milk production, emphasis is being placed on using AAA phosphate to boost the yield of Oregon's dairy pastures. Preference is being given to dairy counties in allocating the state's 5000-ton quota of phosphate for the first six months of 1945. Phosphate supplies in the nation as a whole are considerably below the amount that farmers would use this year if this fertilizer were available in liberal quantities. Part of the shortage has been caused by the increased demand for sulphuric acid in the munitions industry, limiting the amount available for manufacturing superphosphate.

NEW CURRICULUM AT UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

Eugene.—A new curriculum in Basic Liberal Studies, leading to the degree of bachelor of arts in basic liberal studies in the college of liberal arts of the University of Oregon, has been approved by the state board of higher education and will become effective beginning with the academic year 1945-46. The plan of study represents a departure from the free elective system that has been traditional in American Universities for many years. The effect will be to tighten scholastic requirements and present a course of study that will represent a broad crosscut of cultural offerings from the various departments of the college.
