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Cannery Crops to Bring About Same Price as in '44'

Detailed grower support prices by grades for green peas, tomatoes, snap beans and sweet corn grown in Oregon under the 1945 canning vegetable program have been announced by the state AAA committee. Except for beans, which are higher in top grades and lower for poorer sorts, the support levels are unchanged from 1944.

The prices apply to only the four vegetable grown under contract for canning. Last year eight vegetables for both canning and freezing were included.

Growers will obtain the minimum support prices by contracting with canners certified by state AAA committee. Certified canners will agree to pay at least the specified prices and will contract for an acreage approved by the committee as being consistent with 1945 requirements in relation to each plant's packing capacity.

Canners have until March 20 to apply for certification. In addition, reports on contracting performance are required by June 1 for peas and by July 1 for beans, corn and tomatoes. The support prices for 1945, by grades and varieties, follow:

Green snap beans—Grade 1, \$145 a ton, \$10 more than 1944; grade 2, \$125, up \$5; grade 3, \$75, down \$15. Any 6 sieve size beans used by the processor will bring \$25 a ton, as compared with \$50 in 1944.

Wax beans—Grade 1, \$115 a ton; Grade 2, \$65. Prices for both grades are reduced \$5 from the 1944 level.

Green peas, Blue Mountain area: Perfection, Climax and Alaskan varieties—Sieve size 1 and 2, \$133 a ton; sieve 3, \$111; sieve 4, \$77, sieve 5 and 6, \$55. Mardelah and Surprise varieties—Sieve 1 and 2, \$144; sieve 3, \$113; sieve 4, \$80; sieve 5, \$60. Profusion variety—\$80 a ton, field run.

Green peas, Maiheur county—all varieties, \$77.50 a ton, field run.

• Tomatoes, \$26 a ton, field run, with culls out.

Sweet corn, \$23 a ton, field run, with culls out.

The prices for peas are for produce delivered at the viner. For the beans, tomatoes and peas, prices are for deliveries at the cannery or the canner's receiving station.

Red Cross Drive Started March 1st

Rallying under the slogan, "Keep Your Red Cross at His Side," more than 3,000,000 volunteer workers in America, March 1st, officially began the 1945 Red Cross war fund drive to raise \$180,000,000 to continue the worldwide operation of the organization with battle front-troops, in hospitals, and on the home front.

In Lane county, with a goal of \$102,000 for the campaign, hundreds of workers were ready to start Thursday to call on every home in this area to contribute to the relief and mercy work of the Red Cross.

In opening the campaign officially, Basil O'Connor, national Red Cross chairman, emphasized the fact that the need for Red Cross services is greater than ever.

"American men have been fighting throughout the world for a long time. This year they will need all of the moral support we can give them. The American Red Cross is bringing home to those men wherever they may be stationed. The task in the next 12 months will be greater for the Red Cross than ever before, for not only must we serve the men in the war zones, but we will be required to give increasing assistance to the boys coming back to the United States," O'Connor declared.

In Lane County, as elsewhere throughout the country, the Red Cross carries on not only for the men in the armed forces, but in many essential fields of service here.

The Lane County chapter of the American Red Cross monthly is now supplying badly needed blood to ship to men overseas, the mobile unit of the Portland blood center calling at Eugene the second Monday of each month (the next visit to be March 12). To date, in three visits to Lane county, the mobile unit has secured blood from more than 600 persons in this area. During the past year, the Lane county chapter has made and shipped out 1,251,234 surgical dressings, units working in all sections of the county. Volunteer workers put in 7,823 hours in making needed comfort kits; more than 101,000 hours in sewing and knitting to produce about 8000 garments. The county chapter, also, has an active home service department to work with service men and their families, as well as discharged servicemen and their families, in connection with many problems. Other active divisions working under the county chapter include a well organized disaster and relief group, first aid division, an active home nursing program, a nurses' aides department, an active Junior Red Cross program reaching more than 100 schools in the county, a nurse recruitment service, and a prisoner of war service, as well as other volunteer services.

Finishing Facings

Ways of finishing facings differ with the kind of material you have. If your goods is cotton or some other lightweight fabric, turn under the edge of the seam allowance on the facing about one-sixteenth inch, then, stitch. If your goods is thick or non-washable, finish facing by trimming off the seam allowance and stitching ribbon seam binding flat along the edge. Or machine-stitch along the edge and overcast.

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
