WITH THE 44TH DIVISION, SEVENTH ARMY, FRANCE: Private First Class Richard Johnston, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard H. Johnston, 244 North Douglas, Cottage Grove, Oregon has been awarded the Combat Infantryman badge. This badge is awarded for satisfactory performance of duty in ground combat against the enemy, and entitles the soldier to \$10 per month additional pay. The badge is worn on the left breast, above the service ribbons. The local soldier's division went into the line on the Vosges front in France in October, 1944, and is participating in the Seventh Army drive into Germany. The 44th Division is commanded by Brigadier General William F. Dean.

Jack LaLonde A/S of the U. S. Navy left today (Thursday) for Ithaca, New York, where he will enter a midshipman school at Cornell University. Jack is the son of Col. and Mrs. Walter R. LaLonde and prior to entering the service attended Oregon State college at Corvallis. He served several months at the Naval Air Station in Kodiak, Alaska, when combat was in vogue in that section. He had recently completed a 16 months training school at Purdue University in Indiana. Seaman LaLonde has been spending a leave with his parents at their residence located near the U. S. Government dam at Hebron.

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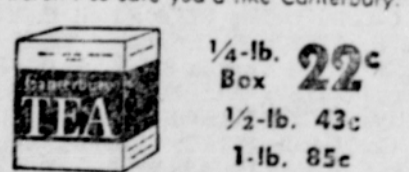


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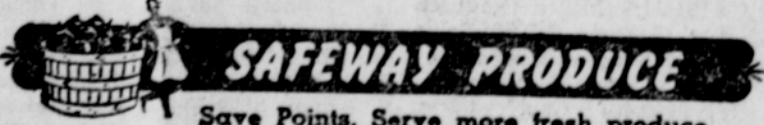

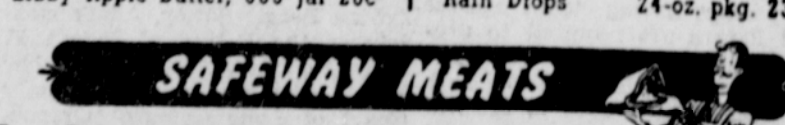
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
