Cougar Hunting Good This Year

Cougar hunting is good this year, according to C. C. Gilham, who with Bill Eastham and Leo Wilson, has killed three big ones the past month. Two of their kills have measured over seven feet long and last Tuesday they got one measuring eight feet and weighing two hundred pounds. The first cat was killed on Table Mountain after finding three fresh deer kills.

There had been talk of fresh deer kills on the Wilson Creek logging during the past few weeks and when the party returned to their forestry camp on Mosby

Creek last Sunday, they took their dogs and trailed over the mountain between the dam and Mosby creek. Before reaching their camp they found two fresh kills and bagged their cougar on the Mosby creek side of the mountain.

They were called to bring their dogs to Big Fall creek last Monday and arrived on a 36-hour old track and by Tuesday had killed their largest cat of the season. A light snow was on the ground and they followed blood sign for some distance. On examining the feet of the big cat after they had killed it, they found fresh blood on the paws but since it had suffered no injury had evidently been on a fresh deer kill.

In addition to the three cougars this hunting party has trailed and shot five lynx cats since deer hunting season closed last fall. Since it is evident that the cats are doing a great deal of deer slaying this winter, this group of hunters stand ready to answer calls to fresh cat tracks with their pack of hounds, which they have especially trained for this purpose.
