Cold Water Best As First Step in Washing Off Milk

Clear, cold water may beat hot soapy suds as a cleanser where milk is involved, points out Miss Lois A. Lutz, extension home management specialist at O. S. C., in calling attention to ways homemakers can save time and trouble in doing ordinary household tasks. The trouble in cleaning milk from dishes or clothes comes from the fact that the calcium and protein in milk are "set" by soap and heat, respectively, Miss Lutz explains.

Most housewives know how hard it is to wash glasses, pitchers and other milk containers clean. Farm housewives are all too familiar with the dull film that comes over milk cans washed with soap, and even with the mass known as "soap stone" that collects on these utensils over a period of time. The reason is that calcium forms an insoluble curd with the soap in the dishwasher which affects not only the looks but also the sanitation of the container. Bacteria and other organisms may be held under this film.

The protein in the milk also makes cleaning difficult, because the heat of the dish water hardens or coagulates it, making a film that is difficult to wash off the surface.

Similarly, milk on clothes, dish cloths, table cloths and towels may leave a stubborn stain after washing. A cloth used to take up spilled milk may come out of the wash tub permanently stiff. Here again, the effect of the soap on calcium and heat on protein show up.

If milky dishes and fabrics are rinsed with clear cold water before coming in contact with warm soapy water, much of the calcium and protein will be carried away so that washing may be done satisfactorily, Miss Lutz suggests.

Cans and pans used for milk on the farm, however, may be washed after rinsing with one of the cleaning agents sold for the purpose under trade names. Most of these also remove "soap stone" if it has already formed.

Urgent Need for More Ore. W.A.C.s

HAMMOND GENERAL HOSPITAL, Modesto, Calif.—With more than 600 battle casualties being brought each week to this neurosurgical center, an urgent plea was made today to women in Oregon to enlist in the Women's Army Corps Purple Heart units and select Hammond hospital for duty.

Because one of the most important departments at a neurosurgical hospital is that of physiotherapy, additional Medical Waacs are needed immediately to assist nurses in this work. Col. L. R. Poust, commanding officer of the hospital, announced, WAC Medical and Surgical technicians also are needed in every other department at the hospital, and numerous clerical workers are needed to handle the important medical reports, he said.

(Hammond hospital is situated three miles from Modesto, Calif., where the citizens have provided Hammond Hospital with a 200 x 75-foot swimming pool, bowling alley and other recreational facilities as their tribute to the men and women in the service.)

Under the Purple Heart Medical Platoon program, special units of Waacs are being organized in cities throughout the country for training at Ft. Oglethorpe, Ga., as Medical or Surgical Technicians or as Medical clerical specialists. Applicants need not have any previous training, it was announced, for free schooling is provided for those between the ages of 20 and 49 who meet army qualifications. Essential war workers are requested to stay on the job.

The training program consists of six weeks of basic military schooling, six weeks of medical or surgical technician training (or the same length of time for clerical specialists) and an additional month of "on-the-job" training at one of the 10 hospitals in the west, one of which is Hammond General Hospital.
