U. S. O. to Publish Newsletter Again

The Lane county USO is again publishing a Newsletter to be sent to men and women from Lane county who are in the armed forces. This Newsletter consists of a miniature four-page newspaper with two pages of news stories of county wide interest, one page of sports news by Dick Strite of the Register Guard, and a page of one sentence news items about Lane's own people in the service.

The first Newsletter was published in November and mailed as a Christmas greeting. Response has been enthusiastic and appreciative replies have come in from the far corners of the globe, from India, Corsica, France, Italy, Burma, Belgium, the Philippines, New Guinea, Persia, England and camps and stations all over the States.

The USO mailed the Newsletter to about 4000 in November, and hope to almost double that number with this issue. It is impossible to reach all of Lane's citizens in uniform unless parents and friends mail in addresses and so it is being asked that addresses be mailed to Mrs. Omar Fendall, director, Lane county USO, Eugene, Oregon, to reach her before April 1.

The USO will appreciate your cooperation, and replies, particularly from overseas, show that those who receive the Newsletter will appreciate your thoughtfulness. There is no charge for this service. Funds are made available for the publication by the USO board.

Methodists Celebrate Reaching Half Way Mark Sunday, Mar. 18.

Following the forenoon service Sunday at the Methodist church a congregational dinner was served in celebration of reaching the half way mark in the building fund drive for the purpose of a new church to be built following the war. The Rev. Frank Brown announced that a little above \$15,000 had been raised of the needed amount, \$30,000, for the proposed structure. The Rev. Brown also displayed the architect's sketch of plans for the exterior of the building which is to front on Washington Avenue where the present Methodist parsonage stands.

Approximately 65 gathered at the tables and Mr. C. N. Land returned thanks. At the conclusion of the dinner a program was presented. S. L. Mackin introduced the speakers, who spoke of the early founding of the church and gave the later history, closing with our obligations and charge for the future. Jack Godard gave the early history of the church and christianity, including as local color the names of the Rev. Moore, Rev. Gardner and J. I. Jones who were among the early pastors and leaders in the local church when it was built in about 1900. Mr. and Mrs. N. E. Compton and Mrs. William Hogate were the only ones present who were members of the congregation early in 1900.

Ore. State Legislature Ends Longest Session Saturday, March 17th.

The 43rd Oregon legislature, the longest in the state's history, ended its session at 6:06 p.m. Saturday at Salem.

The session lasted 69 days, the previous record having been established in 1939, when there was a 66-day session.

The house finished its work at 5:49 p.m. The clocks had been stopped at 5:30 p.m., the hour fixed for adjournment by a resolution passed a few minutes earlier by both houses.

Out of more than 1,000 bills introduced 200 passed both houses and are awaiting the signature of the governor. This number may be

cut considerably by the governor's veto.
