Eggs On Your Menu

One of ways to stretch your meat ration, now that most meat cuts have been returned to the ration list, is to use eggs for they are plentiful and are unrationed.

Nutrition authorities recommend eggs at least three or four times a week, because of their value as body-building food, their high vitamin content, and because they are an excellent source of iron in a form very easily utilized in the body.

Some of the most interesting egg dishes are those that combine eggs with milk and its products. For instance, a soufflé is at its best when made with cheese. Omelets, too, are high in flavor when flavored with sharp cheese and served with a filling of creamed oysters, crabmeat or some special left-over.

There are also many variations in custards, from those that form the basis of a main dish meal to the more familiar custard desserts. Examples of custards in different roles are given in these recipes:

Baked Cheese and Shrimp Custard

4 slices buttered bread (crusts may be removed)
1/3 lb. American cheese
1 cup cooked shrimp
2 eggs, beaten
1 1/2 cups milk
1/3 tsp salt

Cut bread into 1-inch squares. Cut cheese into small pieces. Arrange layers of bread, shrimp, and cheese in buttered casserole. Combine eggs, milk, and salt. Pour over contents of casserole. Place casserole in pan of hot water and bake in a moderately slow oven (325) degrees for one hour. Serves six.

Prune Custard

4 eggs, slightly beaten
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 tsp salt
2 cups milk, scalded
1 cup cooked prunes, chopped
Combine eggs, sugar and salt. Add milk, mix well. Add prunes, sweetened to taste. Pour into buttered molds. Set in pan of warm water. Bake in a moderate oven (350) 45 to 55 minutes. Serves 8.

Sprinkle Clothes

When sprinkling clothes use a bottle sprinkler, a sprayer or clean whisk broom. Dampen most things evenly but lightly; too much moisture means longer ironing but linens must be quite damp for a lovely daisy. Knit cottons and heavy play clothes should not be dampened. Sprinkle things with warm water if you want to begin your ironing soon, but if you possibly can arrange to do so, roll pieces up tightly and leave them overnight.
