Sgt. Duerst Awarded Medal
A NINTH AIR FORCE FIGHTER-BOMBER BASE, Belgium—For meritorious service in connection with military operations in the European Theater of Operations, as chief of a P-38 Lightning fighter-bomber, Technical Sergeant Clarence C. Duerst, 22, of Cottage Grove, Oregon, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal.

"Despite minimum maintenance facilities and heavy operational demands," said Sergeant Duerst's citation, "his aircraft was kept in such a superior condition as to inspire the confidence of the pilot and contribute materially to the operational efficiency of his unit. The resourcefulness and devotion to duty demonstrated by Sergeant Duerst reflect great credit to himself and the Army Air Forces."

Sergeant Duerst is a member of the Ninth Air Force's 474th Fighter Group commanded by Colonel Clinton Wasem of Dover, Ohio. Formerly employed as a logger in a nearby sawmill, Sergeant Duerst entered the armed forces in August, 1942. He has served overseas 12 months. Before coming to Belgium, he served with his unit in France and England. Sergeant Duerst is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Duerst of Diston Route, Cottage Grove, Oregon.

Dick Smith Initiated

An EIGHTH AIR FORCE Second Lieutenant Richard K. Smith, 21-year old B-17 Flying Fortress navigator, of Cottage Grove, Ore., was initiated into battle recently, when bombs from his Fortress dropped on transportation targets in the burning German city of Dresden. The attack, in which Lt. Smith flew his first mission with the Eighth Air Force, was aimed at disrupting Nazi communication centers in the path of Russian assault armor. Formerly a student at Oregon State college, Lt. Smith was given advanced tactical training in England, before going into combat. Lt. Smith is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe T. Smith, 324 Adams Avenue, Cottage Grove. Lt. Smith is serving with the colorful 390th Bombardment Group, which has been decorated by the President for skill and daring in battle, and which shares in another Presidential award for its contribution to the success of the Third Air Division's epic assault on key aircraft factories at Regensburg, Germany. His group has destroyed more than 400 enemy fighters in over 250 operations against military targets in Nazified areas in Europe.

Aerial Map Used In Farm Census Work

Use of aerial photograph-maps is proving highly successful in locating farms and buildings in the taking of the 1945 Census of Agriculture in Census District No. 2, of Oregon, including Lane, Linn, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Curry counties according to an announcement by the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce at Washington, D. C. This was made public here today, by Paul N. Plank, local supervisor of the Census bureau's agricultural division.

The maps were obtained by the census bureau from several government agencies, chiefly from the department of agriculture. This marks the first time that aerial maps have been used to help census takers locate farms and buildings. Use of the maps saves much time and money in enumerating farms. Census takers trained to read maps can determine from the aerial photos the location of fields, highways, railroads, streams, woodlands, and certain other useful land marks.

Census bureau officials explained that the primary reason for using the aerial maps is that many counties and townships do not have up-to-date maps. It has been difficult, heretofore, for census workers to locate more recently developed farms. Complete census coverage is more assured in farm territory mapped in detail by aerial photos.

Due to wartime conditions, the number of aerial maps which are available to the Bureau of the census cover only approximately

300,000 of the 6,000,000 farms in the United States. However, census bureau officials pointed out, experience in taking of the 1945 census of agriculture indicates that more complete coverage by aerial photography may play an important role in censuses of future years.

Cedars

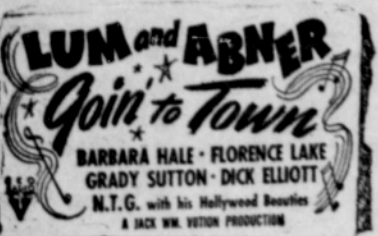

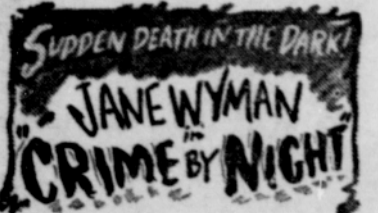

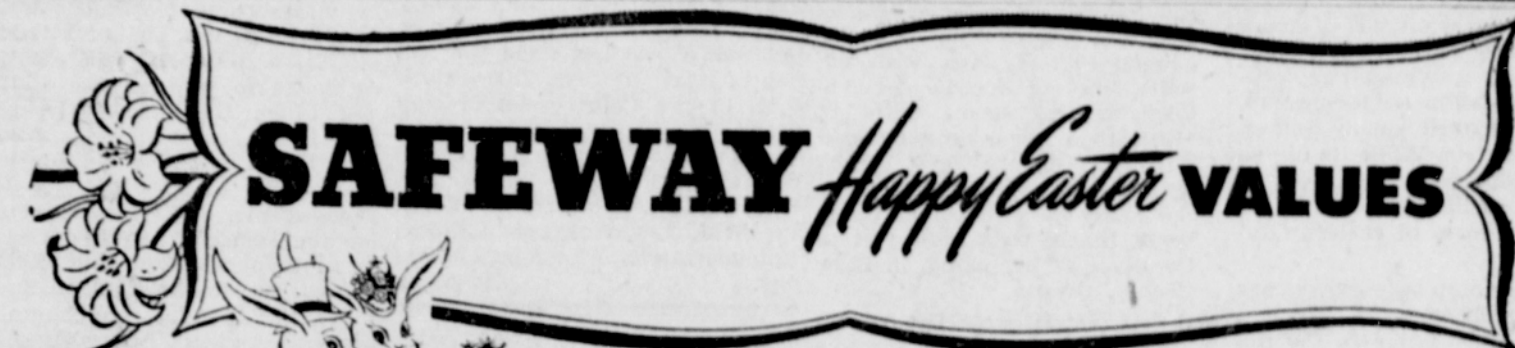
