

Committee Reports On Child Delinquents

The civic improvement committee of the Chamber of Commerce has submitted a report on the juvenile investigation which is being conducted here with recommendations which were approved by the Chamber of Commerce at its session Tuesday. Similar copies of the report will be submitted to other organizations over the community for their consideration.

After reading over the report by paragraph, Chamber of Commerce members agreed that there was nothing mandatory on any individual wishing to assist in correcting the situation here. The report signed by civic interest committee which included Harold Wolfard, Bob Graham, L. W. Coiner and Fred Bliecke was as follows:

Whereas: The Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce has heard a report of investigations into an alarming increase in juvenile shop lifting, petty larceny, "frisking cars," stealing gas coupons, food stamps, drinking intoxicants, illegally securing tobacco, indulging in sex offenses, etc., the Civic Improvement Committee presents the following recommendations for your approval:

Resolved, that the Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce go on record as supporting fully the investigations and plans for control of juvenile delinquencies that are being carried on by Jefferson School and the City Police.

That the Civic Improvement Committee of the Chamber of Commerce attend the next City Council meeting and present a resolution giving full support of the Chamber in a strict enforcement of the curfew ordinance.

That names of volunteer members be submitted who will act as curfew deputies if the council and police so desire. That other organizations be invited to form a similar committee.

That all local merchants police their own establishments for a strict enforcement of all national, state, and local ordinances concerning minors.

That each merchant be given these resolutions for his consideration.

Miss Janet Smith, U. Of O. Secretary, Dies

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—(Special)—Miss Janet Smith, employment secretary at the University of Oregon for more than 11 years and well-known throughout the state, died early Saturday morning, March 31, in Eugene.

Miss Smith, whose fine work in placing university students and graduates in positions throughout the northwest was recognized by both university people and employers, was largely responsible for starting the girls' co-operative houses on the campus. With her aid and leadership these houses, whose tenth anniversary will be observed April 10, have established themselves as outstanding student groups and as an important part of the university housing and self-help facilities.

Miss Smith was also instrumental in obtaining numerous scholarships for the students at the university.

Featured in the March issue of Old Oregon, university alumni magazine, published on the day of her death, is a tribute to Miss Smith as a founder of the co-ed co-operatives. Her picture is carried on the cover of the magazine and an article saluting her work is printed.

Total precipitation for March was 6.88 inches, which looks like this section is making up for lost time the previous five months. The normal rainfall according to the government weather station at the Cottage Grove dam is 4.12 inches which makes March 1945 2.76 inches above normal.

April brought freezing weather with frosts occurring three out of the first four days of the month. Yesterday morning's low was 30 above or two below freezing. Some early fruit was caught in bloom, but damage from the freeze was not extensive according to observers.
