

Star of "An American Romance" Has Few Equals As A "Woman's Man"

"An American Romance," the new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Technicolor hit which opens April 8th at the Arcade Theatre, not only is a stirring film that must be ranked among the year's best, but also presents to film audiences a new kind of matinee idol.

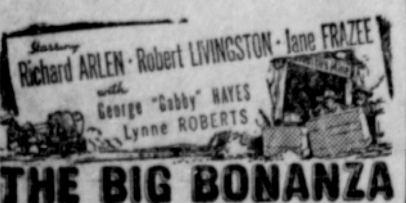

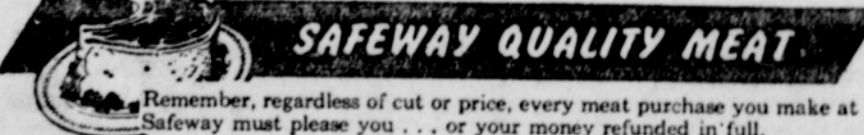

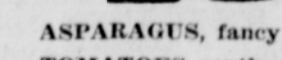
