Presbyterian Aid Meets

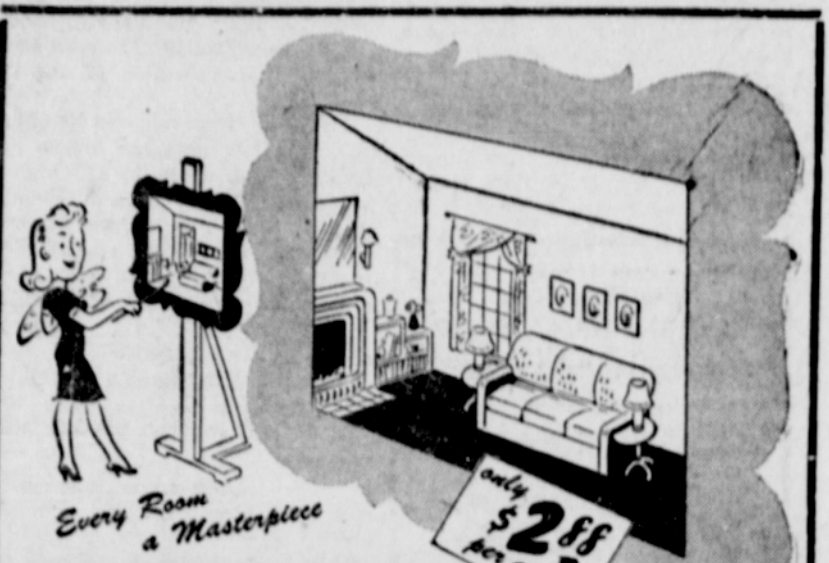
