SUTHERLIN VOTERS REJECT PLANS FOR EXTRA SCHOOL TAX

Sutherlin voters, at a school election April, 11th, defeated two proposals for a special school tax which would have resulted in a levy of approximately 75 mills. On the proposal to exceed the 6 per cent limitation, the vote was Yes 23, No 117.

The proposed budget would have doubled the sum for teachers salaries, making an item of \$30,000 of which \$10,260 was provided for new equipment.
