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TOO LITTLE, TOO LATE, MAYBE

Most of the public is familiar with the critical housing shortage, which if not corrected soon may seriously hamper the future industrial development of this area. Up to now we have done a lot of talking, but like the weather, have done nothing about the situation. As result of the dilly dallying we have recently lost two important industries to other localities nearby. Perhaps you may not be particularly interested in helping in this situation, but here is something to think about which may cause the citizens of the town a lot of regrets in the future. Not only have we lost several opportunities to land new industries, but either we must provide housing here or else some of the lumbermen propose to construct housing near their mills for their own protection. In fact such a move is already underway. This isn't going to be a very healthy situation so far as the town is concerned.

Perhaps the hesitancy on the part of some of the prospects may be due to the fear of running into difficulties in obtaining the necessary materials or of the excessive costs. In a case of this kind, a little investigation might pay big dividends so far as the future of this section is concerned.

Several municipalities not too far from here are carrying out quite a housing project. They don't seem to be running into trouble either on the cost or obtaining materials.

ON LADY SLIPPERS

The following on picking lady slippers was received last week by Mrs. C. H. Woods of London from Mrs. D. W. Brown of Portland:

I was a child gathering Lady-slippers. Piping, childish voices echoing and re-echoing against a wooded hillside. Lush, green moss underfoot, giving way only momentarily to the footsteps upon it—presently to stir, ever slightly, and obliterate the mark left by a careless, heedless foot. Moisture oozing from the rock and from the exposed roots of some towering fir—dripping a continuous, plaintive cadence in an otherwise silent glen. Lace-like ferns edging a chuckling brook that tumultuously hastens down its tortuous course to the sea. And we, silent, orchid-colored fairy slippers exuding their honey-sweetened fragrance and quietly waiting on a hillside to be picked.

I was a child gathering Lady-slippers. And I did not know as they adhered and twined about my fingers that there was a witchery about them—that all the while much stronger tentacles were at—tuning about my heart. I did not know that therein dwelt enchantment and that I could never again be released from their spell.

The brook knew as it chuckled. The rocks and trees and ferns knew as the dripping water gave forth its plaintive cry; warning me to be off, because to linger were never to call one's heart one's own again.
