We Give S&H Green Stamps

Workers Critically Needed in State

In a wire to Mrs. June Bird, local office manager of the United States employment service, L. C. Stoll, state manpower director, said that there will be no slackening in the critical need for workers in Oregon until late autumn or next winter.

"The WMC and USES agencies, together with management, labor and the entire community, has the toughest production schedules still to meet," he said, basing his statement on information just received from the military high command in the nation's capital.

Stoll disclosed the test of an urgent telegram received yesterday from Admiral H. L. Vickery, U. S. Maritime commission, which read:

"The ships presently under contract at the Swan Island and Vancouver yards of Kaiser Company, Inc., and the Oregon Shipbuilding Corporation for the U. S. Maritime commission are vital to planned maritime operations. Any delay in their completion would require revision of those plans and doubtless would have to be paid for in American lives. Accordingly, the Commission trusts that you will continue to give Maritime Commission contractors in your area the same cooperation you have given them in the past until the job is finished.

Stoll expressed alarm over the thousands of workers leaving the area as the result of "V-E Day," adding that the war with the Japs can be won sooner if everyone stays on the job. "The exodus of workers can mean only one thing—delayed deliveries on production schedules of the utmost urgency. He concluded his wire to Mrs. Bird with the statement that "the delay of one day in furnishing war material to fighting Americans in the Pacific is pure sabotage. The WMC and USES reiterates again that the program will be long drawn out to victory. We all must continue to produce to capacity, and not be misled by any premature statements because the war is not over."

Sugar Reserves Now At New Low Level

With domestic sugar reserves at rock bottom, consumers this year for the first time in two decades must depend entirely on current production, the Office of War Information announced this week on behalf of the Office of Price Administration and the War Food Administration.

A sharp reduction in sugar supplies, tremendously increased requirements for liberated Europe and a rate of civilian consumption exceeding allocations have combined to make a reduction in rations of all classes of consumers an immediate necessity, it was explained.

Sugar stamp 36 which became valid May 1 will stretch over a four month period and no additional stamp will be validated prior to September 1. It will be good for five pounds. Local ration boards in addition have been instructed to issue only up to 70 per cent as much sugar for home canning as they issued last year and to limit the amounts per individual to a maximum of 15 pounds, as compared to 20 pounds maximum last year. The maximum amount available to any family will be 120 pounds in contrast to 160 pounds announced earlier this year on the basis of supplies then in prospect.

Sugar allotments for hotels, schools, restaurants and other institutional users are cut consider-

ably and on July 1 when the net allotment for industrial users is made, they may also expect a reduction. OPA is now re-examining all industrial applications and expects to announce intended reductions in the near future.
