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Labor Shortage Hits Lumbering

PORTLAND—The manpower shortage, defying special priority classifications, is responsible for a lumber shortage now the most critical in three years, F. H. Brundage, western log and lumber administrator, declared.

A statement prior to a meeting of the industry's western advisory committee said lumber for military needs was falling far short. Brundage said still more plywood and lumber are needed to shift the war from Europe to the Pacific.

"Practically every operation is short-handed," he said. "Recent losses of experienced and skilled men to selective service further aggravates the production problem."

Chester H. Maxwell of Creswell, an uncle, will accompany Mrs. Maxwell to Denver.

Local Ration Board Prepared to Register Meat Slaughterers

Your local War Price and Rationing board is prepared to expedite the registration of meat slaughterers who offered for sale less than 6,000 pounds during 1944. It was announced yesterday.

The new OPA provision, part of a joint action by the office of economic stabilization, the war food administration, the war department and the office of price administration, is aimed to accomplish a more equitable distribution of meat for civilians and to stamp out black markets.

By bringing the 1,080,000 American farmers who sell their slaughtered meat in small amounts under accountability, regulations, and to encourage non-federally inspected slaughterers to come with provisions permitting the shipments of their meat across state borders, the OPA believes much of the current shortage can be solved.

"The small and independent slaughterer has represented a large quota of uncontrolled meat, and this new control offers both the legitimate slaughterer and the consumer adequate protections against illicit diversion of the commodity," he said.
