LIBERTY'S LIGHTING BOOSTED

When Germany surrenders, the Statue of Liberty will be illuminated in radiance equivalent to 2,500 times full moonlight. Samuel G. Hibben, director of applied lighting for the Westinghouse Lamp Division, doubled the pre-war floodlighting by adding 16 special projectors, each containing a high intensity mercury vapor lamp, and by equipping the 96 1,000-watt floodlights in the former lighting system with modern reflectors and new lenses.

Defrost Refrigerator

Defrost your refrigerator regularly. Heavy frost on freezing coils acts as a blanket and cuts down effectiveness. A speedy defrosting method is to turn off the mechanism, fill ice trays with hot water and let frost drip into the tray below—which has been emptied of food. In 15 or 20 minutes the frost will have loosened.

Net Curtains

Never throw net curtains away just because they are torn. Dip squares of net in cold starch, apply to the torn part on the wrong side of the curtain, and iron with a hot iron. The net will adhere to and blend with the original curtain in such a way that the tear will hardly be visible.
