STARCH IN SURGERY

Surgical dressings that can be sewn up inside wounds are being investigated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

USDA found sponges made of starch would absorb 15 to 18 times their weight of liquids, then gradually dissolve as the wound healed. Their use would do away with the need of reopening wounds to remove dressings.

For surface wounds, the sponges might be filled with penicillin or sulfa drugs, which would be released as the starch dissolved, researchers said.

The citations in part read: "The air medal was awarded for meritorious achievement while participating as a pilot in an attack upon the River road bridges near Italy on March 13, 1944, which resulted in the destruction of both bridges. The oak leaf clusters to the air medal was awarded for meritorious achievement while participating as a pilot in an attack on the Marshall yards in Italy on March 14, 1944, which resulted in the destruction of many vital units and heavy damage to rail yards. The oak leaf cluster to air medal was awarded for an attack while a pilot on a railroad bridge in Italy on April 2, 1944, resulting in destruction of bridge. An oak leaf cluster to air medal for participating as a pilot on a highway in Italy on May 25, 1944, resulting in the establishment of an effective road block. An oak leaf cluster to an air medal while participating in an aerial flight as pilot of a B-26 type aircraft in an attack on railroad bridge in Italy May 16, 1944. One silver oak leaf cluster to medal while flying as pilot in an attack on railroad viaduct in Italy March 21, 1944, resulting in heavy damage to viaduct and destruction of adjacent highway bridge. An oak leaf cluster to air medal while flying as pilot in an attack on railroad bridge in Italy on March 27, 1944, which resulted in heavy damage to bridge and approaches. An oak leaf cluster to air medal while flying as pilot in attack on railroad in Italy on April 6, 1944, resulting in heavy damage to bridge. An oak leaf cluster to air medal while participating as pilot in an attack on main highway in Italy on June 1, 1944, resulting in heavy damage to roadbed.

The decorations will be forwarded to the commanding general, 9th service command, Fort Douglas, Utah, who will select an officer to make the presentation according to the letter received by Mrs. Zimmerly.
