FACING A PROBLEM

Voters within the city limits will probably be asked to approve a special levy of five mills in the near future to make a start toward establishing a sewer fund to extend trunk and storm sewers and to eventually construct a sewerage disposal plant.

Cottage Grove has a long way to go to establish even an adequate sewer system. About twenty percent of the corporate limits is served by cess pools, which is not according to standards of the health department.

Many are familiar with the situation outside of the Eugene city limit will remember that the state health department clamped down on the suburban area, calling attention to the danger of mixing surface wells with cess pools and the unsanitary results.

The only regret is that a move for a special levy was not started two years ago instead of now, which would have placed the town two years ahead of the present setup.

AMERICA SELF CONTAINED

A few may recall that in the early thirties, about the time Hitler was rising on the political horizon, one of the popular books of the time was one called, "America Self Contained."

In trying to work out a scheme for all nations to live and let live, we hope the promoters of international peace don't go to the other extreme and try to overthrow our national economy.

The following is the charter amendment to be voted on: CHARTER AMENDMENT

To amend the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove, by adding a new Chapter thereto, authorizing, empowering and directing the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove to design, construct, reconstruct, add to and repair the sewer and drainage system of the City of Cottage Grove, including all drains, ditches and outlets, for the carrying away of sewage and flood waters, and for the foregoing purpose to levy upon all taxable property in the City a five mill tax levy each year for a period of five consecutive years, commencing with the levy for the tax roll of 1945-1946 said levy to be in addition to and in excess of the constitutional six per cent limitation upon the City's tax levy.

THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Be it enacted by the electors of the City of Cottage Grove, Ore.

Section 1. That the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to design, construct, reconstruct, add to and repair the sewer and drainage system of the City of Cottage Grove including all drains, ditches and outlets for the carrying away of sewage and flood waters, and for the foregoing purpose to levy upon all taxable property in the City of Cottage Grove a five mill tax levy each year for a period of five consecutive years, commencing with the levy for the tax roll of 1945-1946 said levy to be in addition to and in excess of the constitutional six per cent limitation upon the City's tax levy.

Section 2. That the money arising from such levy shall be disbursed by the Common Council by warrants drawn by the Common Council upon a fund which is hereby created by this levy, which fund shall be designated "Special Sewer Fund," said warrants to be signed by the Mayor and City Recorder.
