Limp Window Shades You can give a new and snappy comeback to these limp window shades that refuse to stay put. Remove the shades from their brackets, lifting one end up in the slot, then pulling the other end out of its bracket. Spread shade flat on the bed; hold roller firmly in your left hand; with pliers wind tight the metal nubbin at the end of the roller. Trim frayed edges, sponge shade with light soapuds.

Grand Coulee Second to Boulder dam power plant in capacity is the plant at Grand Coulee dam constructed by the bureau of reclamation on the Columbia river in Washington. Here six of the largest hydroelectric generators in the world, each rated at 108,000 kilowatts, and two units at 75,000 kilowatts, supply power for industries in the Pacific Northwest. This plant will be ready to serve the million-acre reclamation project in the Columbia Basin.

Springy Clothes When sprinkling clothes use a bottle sprinkler, a sprayer or clean whisk broom. Dampen most things evenly but lightly; too much moisture means longer ironing but linens must be quite damp for a lovely finish. Knit cottons and heavy play clothes should not be dampened. Sprinkle things with warm water if you want to begin your ironing soon, but if you possibly can arrange to do so, roll pieces up tightly and leave them overnight.
