Statistics given during the afternoon stated that sugar used last year for the distilling of liquor in our country amounted to 5000 tons a day, 150,000 tons per month or 1,800,000 tons for the year. The amount of grain used for the same purpose during the year of 1942 was barley, 60,000,000 bushels; corn, 10,953,000 bu.; rice, 5,670,000 bu. Money spent during the past year for liquor amounted to \$7,000,000,000 or \$54 per capita or 20 gallons per capita. A letter, requesting that members and friends of the temperance union write to J. A. Gruge, chairman of W.P.B., Washington, D. C., asking that the sugar and grain used for the above purposes be sent along with the clothing to the starving people of ravaged countries, from the president of the Douglas county W. C. T. ## OREGON STATE COLLEGE

Corvallis—One student from Cottage Grove and one from Creswell are among the 325 seniors and graduates scheduled to receive their degrees at the seventy-sixth annual commencement, June 10. Baccalaureate service at 3:30 o'clock and the graduation exercises at 8 o'clock will both be broadcast over KOAC.

Ruth Catherine Miller of Cottage Grove and Marie Ione Hansen of Creswell are the two students who will march in the traditional academic procession and be handed their diplomas at the close of the exercises.

Miss Hansen has majored in home economics, the largest school in the college during the war years. The 108 graduates from this school make up approximately one-third of the total number of graduates. Students in this school are trained both for professional work and for homemaking, and have taken many general or liberal courses.

The school of science is the major of Miss Miller. This school is graduating 36 of which six are pre-medical students who have completed one year in the medical school in Portland before receiving degrees.

Of the total graduating class this year 301 will receive bachelor's degrees, 22 master's and two the highest degree of doctor of philosophy.
