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June 9th Silver Jubilee, Catholic Vacation School

The opening of the religious vacation school June 9, under the auspices of the local Catholic church will mark the silver jubilee of the first religious vacation school operated on an organized basis by the Catholic church in the United States. Lane county, and Cottage Grove in particular, is the birthplace of a movement that has grown to gigantic proportions in a quarter of a century and has had a profound effect upon religious training of Catholic children in the rural areas of America.

In June, 1921, Reverend Edwin V. O'Hara, pastor of St. Mary's Catholic church, Eugene, and now Bishop O'Hara of Kansas City, Missouri, opened religious vacation schools at Cottage Grove, Springfield and Junction City, missions served by the Eugene parish. The missions established at Junction City and Springfield have ceased to exist, but the one at Cottage Grove was maintained and in 1942 was made an independent parish with Rev. James Maxwell first resident pastor.

Since the Cottage Grove parish has conducted religious vacation schools continuously for the past quarter of a century it is truly the cradle of this movement which was to attain nation-wide scope. The local church will be the scene of a formal celebration of this anniversary, Sunday, July 1, when Most Reverend Edward D. Howard D.D., Archbishop of Portland, will be celebrant of the jubilee Mass.

From the small beginning in Lane County in 1921, when there were but three schools, conducted by four teachers for a total of 47 pupils, the religious vacation school idea has spread to all parts of the United States and a survey in 1938 showed 7,112 schools, 21,000 teachers, and 547,000 pupils. There were vacation schools before this time but not on an organized basis. It was principally through the help of the Catholic Rural Life Bureau, a national organization of which Father O'Hara was then executive director, that this rapid growth took place.

The celebration of this anniversary will focus national attention on Cottage Grove in Catholic educational circles during the next month. Over three thousand words of information about Cottage Grove, the local church, the first religious vacation school, its growth in the state and nationally, has already been forwarded by the local pastor, Father Sohier, to the N.C.W.C., national Catholic news service, which expects to give this event wide publicity. Pictures of the interior and exterior of the local church, of the members of the first vacation school pupils, and of others connected with the foundation and growth of this movement have been requested for publicity purposes.

Although generous publicity of this anniversary will be given, the actual celebration will be kept on an informal scale because of wartime conditions and restrictions on travel.

Baking with FRESH PRODUCE

GLAZED FRESH STRAWBERRY PIE
4 cups fresh strawberries 1/2 cup salt
Baked pastry shell 1 cup butter or margarine
1 cup water 2 to 3 drops red food coloring
1/2 cup sugar 4 cups cornstarch
Wash and hull strawberries. Fill baked 9-inch pastry shell with 3 cups whole berries. Cook remaining 1 cup berries, cook with water 5 minutes; strain. To make glaze: Combine sugar, cornstarch, and salt; add to strained juice, and cook 3 minutes, or until thick and clear, adding glaze by spoonfuls over fruit, being careful to coat all thoroughly. Chill. Serve plain or garnish with whipped cream or ice cream and whole berries. Makes 1 9-inch pie. Serves 6 to 8.
PAN-FRIED CHERRIES
An excellent accompaniment to meat or poultry.
2 tbsps. butter or 4 tbsps. brown sugar
8 cups cherries
Melt butter or margarine in heavy frying pan; add cherries and sugar; cover, and cook slowly 15 minutes, or until cherries are tender. Serves 6. Note: May pit cherries before pan-frying.
