16 Lumber Workers Get Certificates

Paul E. Gurske, chairman of the state industrial accident commission has announced that certificates have been awarded to 16 employees of the Chambers Lumber company and six employees of the Blue Mountain Lumber company, for the successful completion of a series of lessons on industrial safety training which were recently conducted by the accident prevention division of the commission.

The course consisted of five two-hour lessons which were held weekly for five consecutive weeks. The objective of the course was to train leadership in an accident prevention program and consisted in studies of plant inspection, accident investigation, job analysis and safety committee work.

News Briefs of Local Interest Here and There

In New York, cooperative education is made to work in a dozen high schools where the high school pupil earns as he learns. Thirty years ago educators decided that many pupils could not go to school unless they worked part time to pay expenses and cooperative education is the result.

School children in the U. S. occupied part of Germany will hear no more about Hitler and the Nazi party members. Dr. Karl Becker, removed as Aachen school director in 1935 because of Jewish blood has been reappointed by the allied military government at the request of the parents committee.

High school enrollment over the nation dropped to a new low this spring because of the draft. The pre-war peak of the school and college graduation of 1940-41 was 31,700,000. The 1944-45 enrollment dropped to about 30,000,000.

Now there is a scarcity of straw hats facing the men of the nation. Materials normally imported are lacking and the straws may disappear before long. There are about ten million sold to the men as dress hats along with twelve million harvest hats.

FARM LUMBER QUOTA FOR OREGON RAISED SLIGHTLY

Oregon has been given a quota of eight million board feet of lumber for farm construction, maintenance and repair during July, August and September, reports N. C. Donaldson, executive assistant to the state AAA committee.

Although the third quarter lumber allocation is slightly larger than that of the previous three months, Donaldson said that it will not be enough to take care of all farm needs. Increased demand because of recent easing of WPB restrictions on building will more than offset the increased quota, he believes.

The lumber is distributed for essential farm uses on AA-2 and AA-3 preference rating certificates issued by county AAA committees. No certificates can be issued for lumber to be used in construction or remodeling of farm dwellings, except for emergency construction to replace farmhouses destroyed by fire.

MORE CRAWLER TRACTORS DUE BUT STILL TOO FEW

Oregon's third quarter allocation of crawler tractors, although larger than for any quarter since rationing began, still is considerably short of the number needed by farmers who depend on crawlers for power, according to a report from the state AAA committee.

The quota for July, August and September is 92 machines, 20 more than for the previous quarter. Applications now on hand are more than sufficient to take up the entire quota. In most cases, consideration can be given only to applications for new equipment to replace worn-out crawlers, state AAA officials say.
