

Larry Teaches Star To Play Harmonica

One out of every thirteen persons in the United States plays the harmonica—which is listed by the Musicians Union as a toy—but one person in the world has raised this "toy" to the level of a virtuoso's concert instrument. He is Larry Adler, who has taken time out from his concerts and jaunts around the battlefronts entertaining soldiers to come to Hollywood to be featured in M-G-M's "Music for Millions," the film starring Margaret O'Brien with Jimmy Durante, which opens July 1st at the Arcade Theatre.

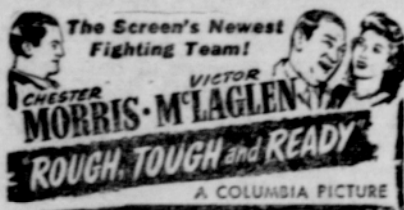

Adler didn't have much time to himself between scenes; other members of the cast kept him busy playing his inimitable harmonica music, and Larry, a good-natured, slight and dark-haired, obliged. His most rapt fan was little Margaret O'Brien. She likes all of his music, but her favorites are foreign folk tunes.

Adler presented her with a harmonica, then taught her how to play. She learned "Turkey in the Straw" in twenty minutes. "At that rate you'll soon play me out of a job," Adler told the seven-year-old star.

There's little chance of that happening for a long time, despite Margaret's ability, for Adler is far and away tops in his field. He has been soloist with symphony orchestras, has given command performances for such high-ranking admirers as President Roosevelt, the two most recent English Georges and their Queens, Kings Haakon of Norway, Gustav of Sweden, the Windsors and the Kents.

Adler, born in Baltimore, Maryland, could carry a tune at a tender age and was given voice training in religious music. At ten he was the youngest cantor in Baltimore and also started to study piano at the Peabody School of Music.

EXTRA GAS FOR SERVICEMEN

Additional gasoline rations may now be obtained by servicemen having furloughs of more than 30 days. E. W. Eggen, OPA mileage rationing representative, announced today.

"Furlough gasoline will still be issued at the rate of a gallon a day," Eggen explained. "But the 30-gallon limit is being removed for the benefit of released American prisoners of war who get leave or temporary duty assignments for sixty days in this country, and for those members of our armed forces who return from overseas and get more than 30 days' leave."

"Servicemen applying for fur-

lough rations should follow these three easy rules:

1. Apply at any local War Price and Rationing Board.
2. Bring along the mileage rationing record for the car to be used.
3. Be ready to show furlough papers."

Summertime Meals

Serve combined berries and thinly sliced oranges with toasted cake slices.
