Popular Maestro Leads Band Also Sings And Dances

Woody Herman, who not only leads his famous band, but sings and dances in Republic's "Earl Carroll Vanities," coming to the Arcade theater July 22, was playing clarinet at the age of 11. A year later he became a professional.

Born in Milwaukee 31 years ago, he was named Woodrow Wilson, but at Marquette University they swiftly cut that down to Woody. After two years in vaudeville he quit his single act and joined Gus Arnheim's band. That led to subsequent spots with Harry Sosnik, Tom Gerun and Isham Jones.

He was singing and playing clarinet and saxophone—in turn—with Jones in 1937, when the leader determined to quit the business. Herman and the boys in the band got together and with him as leader, played the Schroeder hotel in Milwaukee. It was a case of home town boy makes music—but good.

After playing leading hotels and gay spots all over the country, the band won national acclaim and the movies called them to Hollywood. Woody and his boys made their initial screen appearance in "What's Cookin'?" following in "Winter Time," starring Sonja Henie. Their third film "Sensations of 1944," was followed by "Earl Carroll Vanities."

Apart from their regular playing, the band appears frequently at army camps and have won scroll citations signed by Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, from the War Manpower Commission and from Mayor Edward J. Kelly, of Chicago, for aiding in defense activities.

Herman is married and the father of a daughter, Ingrid, born in September, 1941.
