

A.A.A. Plans Laid For 1946 Program Taylor Reports

No radical changes are contemplated in next year's AAA program, unless changing conditions call for emergency modifications, reports R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state AAA committee in Oregon, who has just returned from a national conference of northwest state committeemen at Washington, D. C. Others from Oregon who took part in the conference were William Enchede, Hillsboro, and John Shepherd, Scio, state committeemen; and Arnold Badtger, field man.

Food shortages, both real and fancied, are prime topics of conversation throughout the country Taylor found, with the situation worse in populous eastern centers. Food production goals for next year which are certain to reflect the continuing peak needs here and abroad are expected to call for all-out production of the most essential crops and livestock products.

The Oregon wheat goal for 1946

will be announced soon, well in advance of fall seeding time Taylor reported. A tentative goal was referred to the Oregon committee, passed upon by the technical committee consisting of state college and other agricultural officials, and then returned to Washington with recommendations. It is expected to approximate this year's planted acreage.

Visiting committeemen had an opportunity to meet the new secretary of agriculture, Clinton P. Anderson, and found him a man of vigor and direct action, Taylor reports. He had a special committee working on detailed reorganization plans for the department, but denied that there is any revolutionary overhauling contemplated. Rather there will be changes to clarify functions and responsibilities and speed up operations.

Anderson, a former congressman from New Mexico, is a farm owner and operator of considerable experience himself. He told the committeemen that his policy will be to make the department function with speed and efficiency in getting the best results for American producers and consumers of agricultural products, Taylor says.

POWDERED ORANGE JUICE

Leslie Thompson Is Named State Rep. of USES at Ft. Lewis

As an additional service to returning veterans, Mrs. June H. Bird, manager of the local office of the United States employment service, announces the appointment of Leslie C. Thompson, occupational analyst, as Oregon representative of the USES at Fort Lewis, Washington.

Appointment by L. C. Stoll, state manpower director, Thompson will counsel separation officers on the techniques of converting skills acquired by men while in military service to occupations in civilian industry. Mrs. Bird said. He will be supplied current information about job opportunities and industrial trends by local USES office managers throughout the state, thereby providing veterans with specific detailed material concerning their own home localities.

For the past two years Thompson has done extensive liaison work between the USES and selective service, assisting the latter in determining the essentiality of occupational skills for men whose military deferment had been requested, according to Mrs. Bird.

His occupational analysis experience over the past four years with the USES has covered such industries as transportation, food processing, aircraft, radio manufacturing, foundries, fishing, lumber and logging, and involved the application of Manning Tables and replacement program schedules in assisting selective service and WMC in the equitable allocation and channeling of manpower into war industries.

Thompson served with the American air corp during the last war, and as a commissioned officer (Inf. Res.) from 1933 to 1936.
