University of Oregon, Eugene—Plans have been made for a sorority "rush week" to open on the campus Sunday, September 9. Mrs. Golda Parker Wickham, acting dean of women, has asked that all women coming to the campus for this rush period send in their applications by August 25. No applications, she warns, will be accepted after that date.

Rushes will be housed, this year, in the dormitories, and a \$15 fee is being charged to defray costs of room and board and the Panhellenic fee. Being mailed to rushees, on receipt of their applications, are instructions concerning regulations of rush week, together with a booklet, "Sorority and You," published by the inter-sorority organization, Panhellenic.
