NURNBERG IN RUINS—American soldiers found only rubble-strewn streets and shattered shells of the storied landmarks of the old picture book Bavarian city of Nurnberg. The town made famous by the painters and craftsmen of the middle ages was a Nazi shrine under Hitlerism and became the seat of some of the most important of German war industries. Here were made turbines and diesel engines for powering submarines, Mark V tanks, motor artillery and heavy trucks. Ten visits by Allied air raiders leveled these targets. 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HOMEMADE KITCHEN AIDS SHOWN IN NEW BULLETIN

Kitchens that were built with too little cupboard space can usually be made much more convenient by skillful arranging of dishes, utensils and supplies, says Mrs. Mable Mack, assistant state farm labor supervisor in a leaflet entitled "Labor Saver in the Kitchen."

This leaflet, issued as extension bulletin 655 contains more than a dozen sketches of homemade devices to add to the convenience of the kitchen. These include plans for additional shelves, spice racks, knife racks, laundry supply holders, drawer insets, and directions for adjusting work surface heights.
