172,000 OREGON VETS

War veterans in Oregon upon return of men now serving in the war with Japan will number around 172,000, according to John W. Kelly in his monthly report as executive director of Oregon Postwar Readjustment and Development Commission. Kelly says there are 4,500 Spanish-American War vets, 33,000 from World War I and will be about 133,000 from the present war. Oregon is trying to get additional hospitalization facilities expected to be needed to care for veterans ill or injured.—Oregon Voter.

ON UNIVERSAL MILITARY TRAINING

Dear Editor: We are in the midst of far reaching events, and problems that may alterate our course in history. One such problem confronting us is the issue concerning Universal Military Training for the youth of the post war America.

Universal Military Training in the post war period is definitely a new venture, never before tried in our history it will set a new precedent should it pass. A thing not very easily gotten rid of, so it is most pertinent that we consider its possibilities well before any decision.

Not the same in Europe where post war military training has been tried and the success of it as a preventive measure against war can be shown by this present war and the events preceding it. Russia, Germany, France and Italy have all had post war military training, and the results are quite evident. In all cases the military caste has dominated to some degree the social life of the countries. This country has no celestial cloak to defend it against tyranny and Fascism, so we can expect similar results of the other countries.

After a bit soldiers will be the privileged group with the civilians running a slow second. Chaos and delirium will ride close upon a depression with totalitarianism catching the devil and the hindmost. The hindmost will be the herd of common people who won't know what is happening, until it happens. A pronounced military regime creates unsettled conditions, and unsettled conditions is chaos.

F. of L.," "The National Catholic Women's Union," "Department of Superintendents—National Education Association," "American Federation of Teachers—Commission on Education and Reconstruction," "36th Annual Conference of Governors—June 1944," "Michigan Labor Committee Against Peace-time Conscription," "Association of American Colleges," and many, many others.

Study the problem well then be sure to write your Congressman your opinion. This is very vital. Very sincerely,

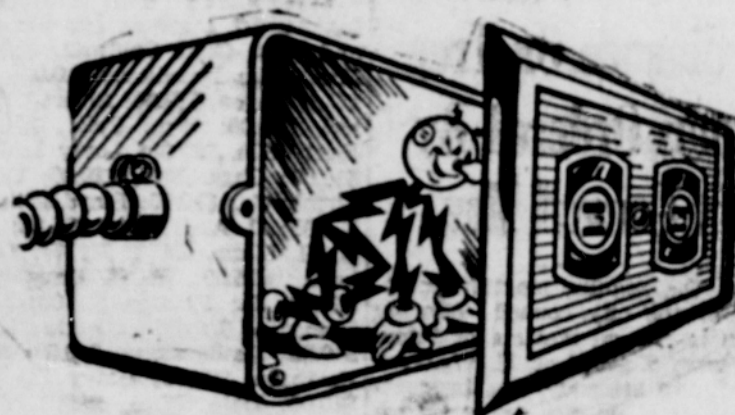
