Logan Discharged

Holborow Awarded Silver Star
With the 96th Division on Okinawa—1st Sgt. William L. Holborow, of Cottage Grove, Oregon, and Los Angeles, has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action on Okinawa.

In making the award, Maj. Gen. J. L. Bradley, commanding the 96th Division, cited Holborow for his great courage and determination during the battle for Kakazu Ridge when he stayed with his company, inspiring the men, even

though twice wounded. The General said:

"1st Sgt. Holborow's gallantry and lack of concern for his personal safety are exemplary of great leadership and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service."

He is the son of Charles Holborow, 5103 Onaknoll Ave., Los Angeles. His wife lives at 1039 Chestnut Ave., Cottage Grove, Oregon.

A veteran of the Leyte campaign, he is a member of the 383rd Infantry Regiment.

National Trends In Meat Market Shown In Review

A national volume of lamb slaughter so far this year equal to that of a year ago, and the start of the annual fall movement of grass cattle to market, are developments of the week reported in the weekly review of market price and outlook information by the OSC Extension service. With cattle slaughter in the last half of 1945 expected to exceed that in the same period of 1944, and with total slaughter probably close to that of last year, the civilian meat supply situation probably will improve considerably before the end of the year, according to the review.

Total meat production thus far in 1945 has been around 12 per cent less than a year ago. Average farm prices for meat are now about seven per cent higher than a year ago with the meat animal farm price index at 172 per cent of the 1935-39 average.

The three principal meat animals—beef cattle, hogs and sheep—usually account for about one-fourth of the total annual volume of Oregon's farm marketings, the review adds, and for about the same proportion of the national farm cash income.

Record slaughtering for California and Texas lambs to date this season is considered partly responsible for the total slaughter so far this year being equal to 1944, even though the national lamb crop is 3½ per cent smaller than last year.

Total receipts of cattle at all principal markets during the week ending August 4 were nearly equal to the same period last year. Owing to lighter marketings of other meat animals, however, the total receipts at the 12 principal markets ran sharply behind those of a year ago. Hog marketings for the week were less than one-half last year's volume while fewer calves and lambs arrived. As the fall grass cattle movement started, reports from Chicago and Kansas
