Road Committee Talks Road Fund With County Court

The road committee of the Chamber of Commerce met with the Lane county court August 10 to discuss disposition of the funds which will be created by the special five mill levy. The levy approved by the voters several months ago is to be used as a post war road project and may be used by the court to improve existing roads to construct new ones, the committee was informed. The special levy in this district will bring in a revenue of \$50,000 over the five-year period or about \$10,000 per year according to present calculations.

Judge Clinton Hurd informed the committee that the state highway department had taken over the Diston road east of town from the east city limit to Culp Creek. Improvements if any to be inaugurated on this road will be up to the highway department but suggestions from interested citizens along the road as well as Cottage Grove will be helpful.

P. M. Morse, county engineer, suggested that part of the fund be spent on the Lorane road and said \$20,000 to \$25,000 spent would make this a first class road. This road has previously been oiled by the county with exception of about three miles over Lorane mountain.

Walter Holland, county commissioner, suggested that the Gowdville road be oiled. Ray Trusk, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee, suggested that connecting roads be made to the main community roads as a matter of fire protection so that fire fighting crews could get to the forest fires quickly.

Committee members were told

there was no chance of getting street. Members were: Ray Trusk, county funds for a new bridge H. W. Lombard, Karl Mills and over the Coast Fork at Main Larry Levens.

Drop batter in pans, filling 3/4 full and bake in moderately hot oven (425° F.) 20 minutes or until done. Makes 12 muffins.
