

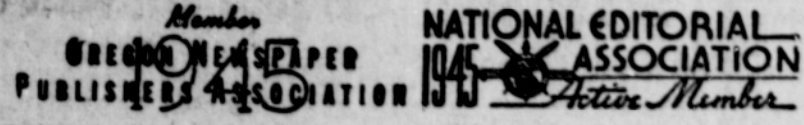

POOR HENRY

Washington political observers regard the 60-million-job idea as a millstone around Henry Wallace's neck. He has said so much about it that if the jobs don't materialize, he is likely to be the public goat.

What few know is that as secretary of commerce he is virtually powerless to do anything about jobs. The President has listened politely to the Wallace plans for action, expressed approval, but hasn't given the green light.

It's a question whether Wallace will call for a show-down with the President now, or later. In the opinion of many economists the country is headed for six or seven million unemployed soon after the end of the war. If Wallace waits until then to speak up, he will be charged with having held his peace too long.

Action may be forced by the growing official concern over unemployment. One was remarked that the atomic bomb really exploded on the second floor of the Mayflower Hotel, headquarters of the Democratic National Committee. Sudden ending of the war, he said, would show up all the Democrats haven't done to prepare for peace.

LOOKING AHEAD

If there ever was a time when Cottage Grove and the surrounding environs deserved the services of a fulltime manager of the Chamber of Commerce, that time is here, it seems to us. There are so many problems coming up in the reconversion period and the average business man can not devote the necessary time to community affairs and keep his business going.

The postwar problems are just as important to our welfare as was the conduct of the war, but with the average community the cooperative spirit stops when the war ends. In the growing locality it continues and there lies the difference between progressive and non-progressive towns. Building factories and encouraging new industries to locate here aren't the only duties of a community manager who can devote his full time to community enterprises. Although we do know of at least one instance not far away where the town landed a half a dozen new industries with the help of a good Chamber of Commerce manager over a period of three or four years and not all of his time was devoted to getting the industries into town, but in seeing that the workers were properly housed after they arrived.

We have now all the necessary organizations to serve a community of six times our population, but we regret to say that all of these organizations have not cooperated properly. There is without reason a certain amount of animosity between these organizations and of passing the buck between the organizations, clubs or what have you. It's been a case of expecting the other fellow to get things done and criticizing him if it was not done, instead of trying to help.

We know there are all kinds of Chamber of Commerce managers, some good, some bad and some indifferent, but this job is no different from any other.

IMPROVING FARM TELEPHONE SERVICE

The telephone companies of the nation have been quietly experimenting with the problem of running telephone lines on electric light poles. In the past, the noise caused by power lines has made this combination service on one pole unsatisfactory.

During the war period, while it has been impossible to get equipment to make telephone extensions in rural areas, electric companies and telephone companies have been carrying on experiments to provide telephone service to rural homes after the war by utilizing existing power line poles, and thus save the expense of building a separate pole line.

One of many such tests is being conducted by the Alabama Power Company and the Southern Bell Telephone Company. Indications are that the practicability of the plan will be demonstrated. There will be "bugs" to be worked out in certain special safety and service equipment, which will require time, but it now seems almost certain that as equipment and instruments become more plentiful, dependable telephone service carried on power poles in rural areas, will become as commonplace as dependable electric service.

We are going to let our readers in on what has been a military secret. Neither we nor Cottage Grove had any part in perfecting the atomic bomb. So many localities are claiming a part in the discovery that we make this statement in fairness to the public.
