Rev. D. A. McLeod Dies July 15th at Springfield, Ill.

Word has been received by friends in Cottage Grove of the death of the Rev. D. A. MacLeod at Springfield, Ill., on July 25, 1945, former pastor of the First Presbyterian church in this city. Rev. MacLeod came to Cottage Grove from North Bend in 1914 and was pastor here for three years. He had many friends here and from the tone of The Raymond, Ill., newspaper, Rev. MacLeod was very popular in that state. He was ill two months and died in Memorial hospital at Springfield. He had served as pastor of First Presbyterian church in Raymond, Ill., ten years. Retired from the ministry in 1939. Was a resident of Springfield at the time of his passing. He was born on Prince Edward Island, Canada, July 4, 1872, and came to the United States at an early age. He served his country in both war and peace, was a veteran of World War I serving at Camp Lewis, Wash. He is survived by his widow, a sister and brother and several nieces and nephews. Funeral services were held at Raymond, Ill., July 25, at which many friends attended from all over the state.

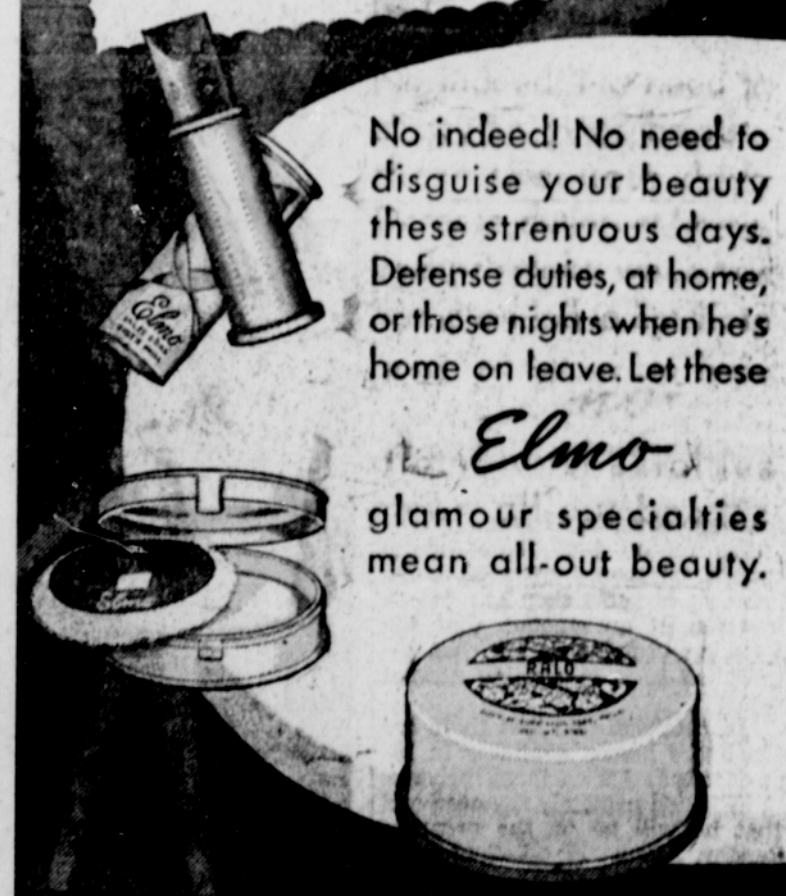
