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PASTE THIS IN YOUR HAT

Writing in Newsweek, Ralph Robey states a few facts that every private citizen should paste in his hat, and this goes double for every public official having authority to spend tax dollars. Almost every day some new plan is proposed for spending a hundred million, 500 million, or a billion tax dollars of the people's money. Mr. Robey suggests that we stop and think where all of this money is coming from—certainly not from the men in the legislative bodies who propose spending it. He points to twelve years of depression after 1929 and asks the question, "Are those the years in which we accumulated the great riches we now propose to deal out so lavishly? . . . For the nation as a whole those were years when we had to draw down, not increase our backlog of wealth."

"We have produced an incredible amount of goods. But it has been, or is in the process of being largely destroyed. A nation does not become wealthy by destroying wealth. Wherein, then, do we get the idea that we are now so rich that we no longer need to think a second time about spending a few billions here and there? The answer really is quite simple. It is to be found in the fact that we have not paid for the war as we went along."

In other words, we are in debt up to our eyes.

The billions of dollars of bonds and deposits and paper money we now have for the most part represent goods which no longer exist. If they are worth anything in the future, said Mr. Robey, it will be only because they are validated by new production. That's what the politicians and the people must remember, when they talk about spending more billions for peacetime public projects which are not absolutely necessary. We are coming out of this war a much poorer nation and we can afford much less today than we could ten years ago. Government should offer every possible encouragement to individuals and industry to produce and save and create new wealth, and cut its own expenses to the bone.

CIVILIZATION'S REAL THREAT

Some have refused to be disturbed over the possibilities of the atomic bomb and what it could do to the civilian population in future wars. It is argued that the same prediction has been made after every improvement in warfare's technique, but when a discovery is hailed as the most important since the discovery of fire, you can't laugh off the consequences.

Although victorious this time, General Douglas MacArthur recently warned that if we can't stop wars, we face Armageddon. It's time we tried to improve human character in the same degree as scientific advancements have been made. This is the only safeguard for the human race. If there was ever a time when the public had a real stake in keeping the peace, that time is here.

The reason the citizens of every nation should insist that world peace be established on a sound foundation this time, is made evident by the casualty figures released by the British Commonwealth and Empire. And it is well to remember that the atomic bomb had not added its toll to the figures recorded. If Germany had been able to use it, London would have been a barren waste and New York a city of skyscraper skeletons.

As it was, the total British casualties were 1,427,643 killed, wounded, missing or prisoner of war. These figures included 532,233 dead or missing. Civilian casualties were 60,585 killed and 86,175 wounded.

It is no worse for a civilian to be killed or wounded in war than for a soldier—death is as final for either. But it brings war closer home to the people and impresses on them the fact that they are responsible for government, its officials and its policies. They must take more interest in seeing that small cliques and groups of men are not permitted to endanger life and property to gratify personal greed and ambition.

The agencies of destruction perfected in World War II, to turn loose upon the world, indicate that if another war is permitted, it will be the civilian populations that are wiped out. Therefore, it is up to the people themselves to prevent such a catastrophe.

TOO LATE, MAYBE TOO LITTLE

It now appears that the forty-unit federal housing project here as well as many hundreds of others over the country is ready for the ash can. Viewing the situation from the private industry angle, it would be extremely bad business to quit a project as near ready as this one, more especially because of the housing demand, but from a government's point of view it may mean saving the taxpayers dollars.

If Cottage Grove had not been too late with too little, we might have been in a better condition so far as the housing situation is concerned. We were too late in waking up to the housing need, otherwise the project stopped here would have been in use. We are no more ready for other reconversion problems than we were with providing housing facilities. Getting our pants down on the housing situation ought to have been a lesson to us, but will it?

TRUMAN ASKS CONGRESS FOR \$3 1/2 BILLION CUTBACKS

Washington — President Truman yesterday recommended to congress cutbacks totaling \$3,500,000,000 in appropriations for civilian war agencies.

Emphasizing that today's recommendations were just the beginning, the president pointed out that they do not include any for the military activities of the War and Navy departments. The president said he would make recommendations regarding those departments within a few days.

Round-Up Beauty Queen

Pendleton, Aug. 3.—Riding in the Indian section of the Pendleton Round-Up parades Sept. 12, 13, 14, and 15 will be lovely Delores Stevens, winner of the 1944 American Beauty contest at the Pendleton show.

Only at the Round-Up is such a contest held; it's for full-blood Indian girls, real American beauties, and one of the rules is that the winner may be queen only once. So Delores will not be in competition this year but will be accorded special honors as 1944 queen. The contest is a feature of Friday's show, when scores of Indian beauties ride before the grandstands for the approval of the judges. Contestants are judged not only for personal beauty, but for the splendor of their costumes and the elaborate trappings of their horses.

Purses at the thirty-fourth Pendleton Round-Up will total \$10,000 and in addition top-hand cowboys will compete for the \$5,000 sterling silver Sam Jackson trophy awarded all-around champion, \$500 in war bonds offered by the Round-Up to the permanent winner of the Sam Jackson trophy, \$300 in war bonds offered by Hamley & Co. saddlery for the winner of the steer roping, the \$75 John Hamley gold and silver belt buckle for all-around champion, and the \$75 gold and silver buckle offered by the Plymouth Cordage Co. of Massachusetts for the calf roping.

Bulk of the money goes for the five major events of the Round-Up—bronc riding, bulldogging, calf roping, steer roping and Brahma steer riding, each \$1100. These events determine the winners of the Jackson trophy and Hamley buckle.

The Jackson trophy must be won three times for permanent possession and three cowboys, Ike Rude, Bill McMacken and Everett Bowman have two legs on the prize. Bowman has announced that he has retired from the rodeo game, so this year's strongest contenders for permanent possession and the \$500 in bonds will be Rude and McMacken. With one win to his credit, Gene Rambo, young California cowboy, 1944 winner, will defend his title. All events at the Round-Up are governed by Rodeo Association of America rules.

PHYSICAL FITNESS DEPENDS ON CORRECT BODY ALIGNMENT

Symptoms May Result from "Parts Out of Place."

An interesting article on Physical Fitness is presented in a recent issue in Good Health. The author, Mathilde Messner points out the great importance of body alignment and good health:

"Due to the great mental, emotional and physical strain induced by the war, a great need for every individual to attain the highest degree of physical fitness possible is quite apparent. As the body is mechanically constructed, the correct body alignment, correct body balance, and correct body mechanics, play an important role in a well planned physical fitness program."

"Good posture with perfect balance of the head and shoulders, definitely lessens the strain upon the bony structures of the body, as well as the muscles and tendons, and thereby tends to prevent fatigue and headache."

"The correct balance of the spinal curve (the backbone of the upright figure), which aids in the support of the abdominal viscera, also promotes normal functioning of the internal organs."

"Good posture is also of great importance from the esthetic standpoint. Beauty experts agree that good posture is the foundation of beauty. A person's carriage and gait reveal more about him than his name or the clothes he wears. Maintaining a good posture in walking or standing, and also sitting in a chair or rising from it correctly makes for grace, poise, and charm."

"Some of the finest examples of good posture may be found among healthy primitive people living a simple, natural life. Their graceful carriage while carrying jars of water upon their heads is indeed beautiful and enviable. Women desirous of attaining posture, especially movie stars, endeavor to emulate this fine poise by balancing books upon their heads while walking, and under a critical eye of an instructor, learn to sit and move about gracefully."

"Every mechanic knows that an automobile with a chassis which has been put out of line by an accident is likely to be a constant source of trouble. An old saying, 'A place for everything and everything in its place,' applies equally well to the body as to everyday affairs of life. Bad posture may in fact, move vital organs considerable distances from their basis, or crowd them so seriously as to interfere with their function, and thus produce vague symptoms which may be difficult of accurate diagnosis."
