TOKYO OCCUPATION

Yokohama—The occupation of Tokyo will begin Saturday (Friday U. S. date).

The U. S. First (dismounted) cavalry division, first into Manila, where it liberated Santo Tomas internment camp last February, will enter the bomb-shattered capital city then.

General MacArthur is expected to move his headquarters from Yokohama to the United States embassy building in Tokyo about the same time.

All Feeds Except Hay in Stronger Market Position

Feed grain markets were steadier to firmer during the week ended August 31, influenced by the scarcity of available corn and suspension of Commodity Credit corporation offerings of wheat for feed. Mid-west markets strengthened on oats and barley. Malt barley continued firm at San Francisco and top mellow-malt barley advanced to the ceiling at Minneapolis. Pacific coast hay markets were unsteady to weaker.

Despite larger output of several kinds of feedstuffs than a year ago, the scarcity persists. Pacific coast markets remained very strong during the week ended August 28 and mid-west markets were about unchanged. The United States index of feed-stuffs prices remained at about 99 per cent of a year ago.

As in July, cattle receipts at the 12 principal stockyards were smaller than last year the first three weeks of August, but ran

ahead substantially the fourth week. Calf marketings also increased to about the same rate as a year previous after running behind for several weeks. Beef production during the rest of 1945 probably will continue greater than a year previous, with other meat animals falling below last year. Not much change in the total number of cattle in the United States is expected to occur during 1945, however.

The market for mohair has shown strength in recent weeks. During the week ending August 24 mohair 30's brought 83 to 85 cents, 28's 77 1/2 cents, and 26's 66 to 67 cents, according to the Boston wool market report. Sales of domestic wools have been quite limited during recent weeks. Although mandatory sales of wool to the Commodity Credit corporation are terminated, vendors may elect to sell to that agency of the government as the previous regulations provide.

Principal live poultry markets along the Pacific coast remained about unchanged during the week ending August 31, although arrivals are increasing. Turkey production in the whole country is expected to reach 44 million raised this year, 22 per cent above the record high crop of 1944. Broiler

chicken production is also above last year, but the number of old hens is around 6 per cent smaller. The number of pullets is around 7 per cent larger, however.
