ACTION IN ORDER

Discussing the matter of proper handling of the Tillamook burn area, Forest Grove News-Times said: "If the state has not the means nor the leadership to push through a program of utilization and conservation of this large area then the area had better be turned over to the federal forestry department as rapidly as possible. State operation is to be preferred. We are not willing to grant that far-away Washington, D. C., direction is to be preferred to more local type of management. However, we would like to see some action at Salem other than appointment of more committees, to vindicate our faith in local government. Millions of future wealth and employment are involved in the project. If the state will not assume the responsibility, it had better step aside to make way for conversion of the area into a great national forest."

1946 Cover Crop Program Set By U. S. Government

Prices to Oregon farmers for winter cover crop seeds produced in 1946 again will be supported by the department of agriculture through a purchase and loan program, R. B. Taylor, state director of the USDA Production and Marketing administration, has announced following receipt of word from Washington.

The support program will apply to the same varieties as those covered this year. Prices of four varieties will be supported by purchases from farmers of cleaned, bagged seed, at the following prices per pound for top quality seed:

Hairy vetch, 12 cents; Willamette vetch, 6 cents; crimson clover, 11½ cents; common ryegrass, 7½ cents. These prices are unchanged from this year.

Specifications, grade differentials and other details have not been completed and will be announced at a later date. Announcement of the basic prices is made now so that farmers will have the information before making fall planting, Taylor explained.

Although qualifications for Willamette vetch have not been announced, Taylor advised that the final program is sure to require use of certified blue tag seed for planting. Crops produced from other than blue tag seed will not be eligible.

As in 1945, the price of Austrian winter field peas will be supported through a non-recourse loan program. The loan rate per pound for top-quality seed remains at 3½ cents a pound. Loans will also be available on rough peavine seed at 3½ cents a pound.

The state PMA director added that early announcement will be made of 1946 cover crop seed production goals for Oregon, reflecting expected needs for next year.

SUNLIGHT DESTROYS GERMS

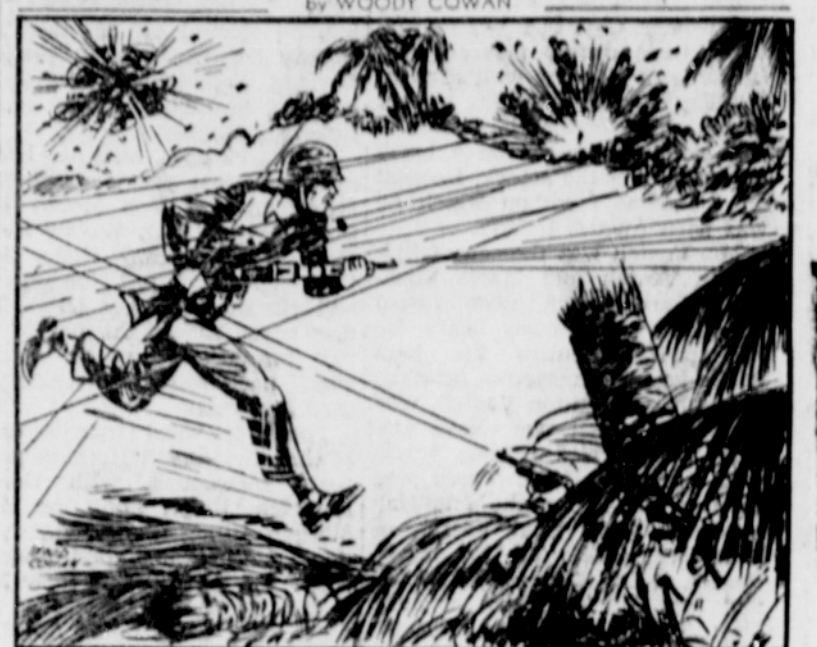
The action of the sunlight in dust was studied by Dr. Lawrence P. Gorrod and described in the British Medical Journal. Dust gathered from places in hospital wards which received little day light was found to contain an abundance of germs, but in that gathered near windows was free from germs. It is not necessary that the sun rays should fall directly on the space; ordinarily diffused sunlight coming from common window glass is effective. Streptococci survived more than a hundred days in the dust filled dark closet. Other disease organisms were also found. These experiments suggest the value of admitting sunlight freely in the homes as well as into hospital wards.
