Maybe the atomic bomb will change this picture. At least the ultimate effect on property values in the crowded centers which might be wiped out by a single bomb won't be very healthy.

ON WINGS AND WHEELS

The war caused many people to think they would soon be riding in a jet propelled plane. But the research department of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana says: "Jet planes, even with their ability to use heavy fuels, will probably not come into ordinary use for private or commercial planes for a long time, if ever."

The survey was part of the company's study of future fuels and requirements, and dealt entirely with civil aircraft. It said: "A jet plane must fly high and fast. Since high-altitude, high-speed flight is expensive no matter what kind of engine is used, the experts feel the jet plane will hardly fit into the economic picture. Most experts feel that the large airplane of tomorrow will use propellers, but that the propellers will be driven by gas turbines . . . particularly as planes are built that need engines of greater than 3,000 horsepower."

When my granddaughter, Ollie, came to my apartment Sunday asking me if I would like to take a drive with Mr. and Mrs. Frank Crouse, her mother and herself, to Clear Lake, in Linn county, I never waited to make a cup of coffee but was soon ready to drive via Springfield. One noted the many new homes going up in East Springfield and admired the many older homes there. The drive to Clear Lake was a joy from start to finish.

I have seen several of Oregon's lakes including Crater Lake, but I believe Clear lake has Crater lake beaten for sheer beauty of colors of the water. It is almost unbelievable. The deepest blue and emerald green, the petrified forest one can look down through the clear water and see. One woman said it was an awe inspiring sight.

Growing among the lake beds bordering one shore of the lake are clumps of vine maple, turning red. The two falls we viewed, as we went up were something it would take Bayard Taylor or John Muir to describe. (Who remembers these writers?)

It had been 46 years since I had been up the highway as far as Upper Soda, but that day we came into the highway above there. Near the top of one of the highest mountains stands a great up and down immense rock looking like a Citadel and on this rock a lookout station and looking down from these lofty mountains one could see an immense deep canyon. In 1911 this was swept by an awful fire, but today it is a delight to the eye, a growth of green trees hide the old burn. The highway skirts the edge. We drove two miles from Clear Lake out to the Santiam highway, coming in what was called Upper Soda in the early days.

Forty-six years ago we spent a vacation with our family at Cascadia. One day we drove to Upper Soda paying \$1.00 to pass through the toll gate. That day we zipped by Upper Soda hardly recognizing the place. We stopped at Cascadia and sampled the water. Shucks, it did not taste like it did forty years ago (Nettie says its too salty).

Cascadia springs impressed me as being badly neglected, but we noted a fine high school down the road. Sweet Home has built up into a thriving place. Our drive covered 200 miles and we enjoyed every minute of it. It will soon be 80 years since I arrived on this terrestrial ball and one of the out-

standing changes I note is the wonderful roads and the way we get over them.

I got a great deal of pleasure out of the trip and as I viewed the wonders I thought of the scriptures where it says: "It has never entered the mind of man the wonderful things God has prepared for those who love and serve him."

So I am looking forward.
