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POST-WAR RECREATIONAL POSSIBILITIES

In the past two years there has been a great deal of talk about providing the youth the proper recreational facilities here, but so far nothing very definite has been blue printed in the way of providing facilities. We are afraid all the discussion about ways and means to supply proper equipment for wholesome entertainment has been like Mark Twain's remark about the weather.

Problems arising out of the proper bringing up of the youth is still largely one of parental supervision, but we can not apply the mode of living our grandfathers endured to the present generation and make it work. The youth problem was not present fifty years ago in the degree it is today, but who wants to go back fifty years to the horse and buggy days? We don't and we don't believe anybody else does.

Even the average small community has something to offer the returning veterans and the youth in recreation or has the blue print made for such projects. Softball with its lighted field has been accepted even in the crossroads community. The average community either has or is making plans for a municipal swimming pool. Many have high school stadiums or have the stadiums planned. Others have parks, skating rinks, etc., mapped for a post-war project.

Here we had a two-mill levy voted in the high school district to finish a high school athletic field, but for some reason through no fault of the high school officials, the levy was not placed on the tax rolls in time for the current tax collections. How the omission will affect the eventual outcome of the project is yet to be determined, but unless some steps are taken to assure a reasonably early start on the project, high school football under the lights may be out until a new field is constructed.

Kelly field has been leased to the softball association presumably to resume softball next summer. Some of the high school board members say they are going to protest the leasing of Kelly field under the circumstances since part of the field is owned by the high school. Position of the softball association is that the lighting equipment is in such condition that to move the equipment another time or two, it will be worthless.

There ought to be a way out of the dilemma and it should not be waiting either for prices to come down, because the best guesses are we won't see low prices for several years.
