Lane County Victory Bond Quota Is Set

Lane county's quota in the Victory Loan drive set to start October 29 will be \$2,500,000 of which \$1,050,000 will be E's.

The quota on other sales to individuals will be \$550,000 with sales to corporations quoted at \$900,000.

Oregon's quota for the Victory Loan will be \$69,500,000 with \$22,500,000 in E's, \$17,000,000 other issues to individuals and \$30,000,000 to corporations.

Bonds available for the campaign in addition to the regular E, F and G series will include 2-4's, 2-1/2's and 7-8's and series C Treasury savings notes. All the special issues possess unusual investment features and may be used as collateral for bank loans. 2-4's and 2-1/2's will be dated November 15 and the 7-8's December 3.
