## Brush Up Nap

Textile specialists suggest special care in brushing up the nap or fluffy surface of cotton chenille spreads and wool blankets. The nap on chenille spreads may be fluffed by shaking them occasionally as they dry on the line and rubbing briskly with the hand or a soft brush. Give them a final rub after they are dry. To raise the nap on wool blankets, however, a clean, stiff whisk broom is recommended, but the brushing must be done after the blanket is thoroughly dry.

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
