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FOOLISH RULING

Stock in the Cottage Grove Lions football squad is rising again since the performance of the eleven on the home grounds last Friday and there is talk that the Lions ought to have a crack at the state championship if the team can maintain the present pace. If, and it's a big if to surmount, if the team were eligible to compete, but it seems that there is some sort of ruling that the enrollment of the high school is not sufficient according to the rules and regulations of the state athletic association that says we are too small.

If a team plays championship football and has only eleven men on the squad they should be permitted to have a crack at the state championship. Good football is not confined to the big centers any more than any other sport. Many will remember before the national basketball championship was disbanded, many a cross-road team won national honors and football is no different.

When will the state association quit penalizing the small schools of the state? Public opinion and a sense of fair play should be used to force a change in this damphool regulation.

SAVE CITIES FROM BLIGHT

In the current issue of the Oregon Voter there is a timely editorial on the improvement of cities and municipalities if they are to survive and to quote the editorial in part: "Evils of real estate blight are intensified in our cities with every development in the surrounding suburban area."

"To create a new civic center is no more of a cure than buying a new hat is a cure of abdominal ulcers."

"Like cancers, these areas of civic deterioration must have surgery that will remove them to make room for healthy growths of private and public improvement that will save and enhance taxable and social values. Unless removed, these spots spread their decay and not only impair or destroy the values of other property upon which a city must depend for taxes, but they harbor evils which run up the cost of city government while reducing the tax base."

Oregon realtors meeting in Gerhart this week can develop a leadership of sound policies in this respect.

"As we said before, it ought not to be necessary for a city to be bombed in order to arouse its leadership to realize that it is just as necessary to reconstruct depressed areas as it is demolished areas. This reconstruction will involve relocation of streets, establishment of parks, proper zoning and protection for private investment in residential, business or industrial properties, both present and future."

"Our cities at present lack powers to take over these blighted areas and develop them. It may be questioned whether a city government as now constituted or some new form of municipal agency should be invested with such broad powers."

THE BOYS ON OKINAWA WANT TO COME HOME

Mrs. O'Laughlin has passed on to The Sentinel a copy of "The Buccaneer," a troop publication of the Tenth Army and in the October 11th issue the question as to why the army wants to maintain thousands of men on Okinawa. The boys have not been able to find out, but ask this question after cleaning up after the typhoon in which the army lost thousands of dollars worth of equipment. Additionally the health of hundreds of others hospitalized in the crude army hospitals was impaired as well as that of hundreds of others left to face the storm. Yet the boys are standing up, walking, wearing out their trouser seats, wearing out shoe leather, wasting gasoline, riding around doing nothing. For what? They say they have not figured it out or been able to find the answer.

And to quote the final paragraph of the editorial: "While the bureaucrats in Washington and those in the field who hate to admit the war is over debate the welfare of the American soldier, thousands of men, fathers, sons and brothers, upon whom the future of America depends are forced to stay out here on this disease-ridden island, to rot for an indefinite time."

Cattle Slaughter Hits Record High With Prices Firm

Despite a record rate of cattle slaughter the nation's livestock markets still held active and strong during the week ending October 20. Fat cattle prices were helped by relatively light marketings of hogs and sheep. Current demands for feeder cattle were stimulated owing to the large amount of soft corn from the 1945 crop.

From January through September cattle slaughter under federal inspection was 5 percent above average. An all-time record for the month was set in September at 4 percent over a year before. On the other hand, hog slaughter under federal inspection in September was almost a record low at 55 percent of September 1944 and 53 percent of the average in September.

The large volume of cattle moving to market reflects total numbers in the United States on January 1 in relation to the population 14 percent above the 1935-1939 average. That is unusually high and only slightly smaller than a year before. The increase in beef animals is greater, as the number of milk cows in relation to the population was only 4 percent larger than prewar.

Prices for beef cattle on farms in Oregon at mid-September were at a level 197 percent of the 1935-1939 average against 159 percent a year ago. The United States average was at 127 percent of parity, a decrease of six points from mid-August but still 17 points above September 1944. Farm prices for all farm products combined stood at 113 percent of parity at mid-September with farm wage rates omitted from the parity formula.

Total meat production in 1946 probably will exceed 1945 somewhat. Cattle slaughter is expected to continue large and some increase in hogs is expected, but probably fewer lambs. Civilian demand for meat will continue very strong compared with 1935-1939 while the purchasing power of consumers remains high. Overseas shipments probably will be far less in 1946 than this year, but larger than prewar.

Seal Linoleum

Small cuts, cracks or scratches in the surface of linoleum may be partly healed by occasionally rubbing with boiled linseed oil. Have the surface clean and dry before rubbing in the oil. Wipe off any oil left on the surface afterward with a soft cloth. Allow area to dry 48 hours before washing again.
