Willamette River Worse Polluted Than Ever Before

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—"Seriously polluted and grossly contaminated" are the terms applied to the Willamette river in the 1945 progress report on pollution of Oregon streams, just published by the engineering experiment station of Oregon State college. This report, prepared by Fred Merryfield, associate professor of engineering, and W. G. Wilnot, field engineer, records the results of the studies made in 1944 under authorization of the state sanitary authority. Cooperating agencies included the State Game commission, State Board of Health, the Hydro-electric commission and the League of Oregon Cities.

Throughout the length of the river, there was considerably more pollution than existed in 1929, when an earlier survey was made. The river has degraded upstream rapidly since that earlier survey, the report shows.

The comprehensive study made last summer was far more inclusive than the earlier one, as it was designed not only to determine conditions but to obtain detailed data for use by cooperating cities in designing new or replacement sewage systems and sewage treating plants. The city engineers and superintendents of 22 cooperating municipalities in the Willamette valley and eastern Oregon are cited in the report as having given invaluable assistance in the survey work.

As a result of last year's findings, additional fields of study needed to obtain more specific information were recommended. This additional work was authorized and has carried on this summer under the same sponsorship.

Only three smaller cities of the Willamette valley are now employing sewage treatment, while the remaining cities are discharging raw sewage directly or indirectly into the Willamette river.

The report, published as bulletin series, No. 19, lists many conclusions and recommendations arrived at as a result of the year's study and points not only to the need of well designed sewage plants, but also to the need of a training program for treatment plant operators. Increasing volume of industrial wastes and the problems of their disposal is also given much attention in the 62-page bulletin.

No Drug Found To Cure Tuberculosis

A warning that tuberculosis patients may prolong their illness, may even die needlessly, if they refuse well-established methods of treatment in the hope of receiving new, unproved drugs, has been issued by H. Corwin Hinshaw, M.D., and William H. Feldman, D. V. M., both of the Mayo Foundation, writing in the October Bulletin of the National Tuberculosis Association.

Dr. Hinshaw is the chairman of the Committee on Therapy of the Association's medical section, The American Trudeau Society. He and Dr. Feldman have been engaged in tuberculosis research for many years and are at present experimenting with streptomycin, a new substance derived from soil-inhabiting fungi.

In warning against the present optimism regarding "a drug to cure" tuberculosis, they state that no drug known today has been thoroughly proved to be effective, "and at this time of uncertainty, it would appear unwise for any patient with tuberculosis to discard the known benefits of rest treatment for the uncertainties of treatment with a new drug."

They point out that the sulfone series (promin, diasone and promizole), the first preparations to arrest tuberculosis in guinea pigs, are still in the experimental stage as far as tuberculosis in man is concerned, and add that experience with the drugs in the treatment of several hundred patients has greatly tempered the early hopes of some physicians. Pencilin, they state, appears to have no effect on tuberculosis in either guinea pigs or man.

Their recent work with streptomycin, they report, has shown that the substance is toxic and not effective in treating guinea pig tuberculosis. And, though they report a degree of success with streptomycin in treating tuberculosis in guinea pigs, they emphasize that complete study of the drug in treating human tuberculosis has not been made and, hence, no evaluation is possible.

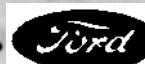

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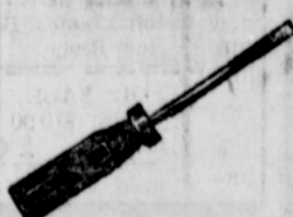
