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Victory Queen Contest To Start Here Nov. 5th

How would you like to be known as the Western Victory Queen and receive a one year film contract at a Hollywood studio?

State-wide plans and organization for the selection of Oregon's Victory Queen contest winner were set in motion early this week by the motion picture theatres and newspapers throughout the state in cooperation with the Oregon War Finance Committee.

The contest has been designed to stimulate the sale of over twenty million dollars of E bonds—Oregon's victory loan quota.

The Victory Queen Contest will embrace Oregon's 36 counties, representatives of which met in five regional meetings throughout Oregon this week with members of the Newspaper Publisher's Association, Motion Picture Industry and the War Finance Committee.

Winner of the contest will send some Oregon girl on a free trip to Hollywood, entitle her to a screen test with the chance of receiving a one-year film contract and to bear the title of Western Bond Queen.

The week beginning November 5 will officially open nominations for the Victory Queen contest. Any girl desiring to enter the contest must have reached her eighteenth birthday and be not more than twenty-six years of age. Applications are to be made to the local county war finance committee chairman on blanks which will be furnished in the Sentinel for that purpose. The contestant is also requested to file her application with the chairman of her local town Victory Queen Contest Committee.

Official contest ballots are being distributed to bond issuing agents throughout the state with the request that they begin issuing them with all E bond purchases starting November 5.

Every \$18.75 E bond investment made between the official opening of the contest and December 1 will entitle the purchaser to one vote for his favorite queen candidate.

The girl in each county having the most votes at midnight December 1 will be declared the town's queen. She will go to the county seat to participate in the county finals with winners from all other towns in her county at a date to be announced later. All county winners will participate in the state finals in Portland for the queenship and the awards that go with it, which have been arranged by the motion picture theatres.

In addition to the Hollywood trip and the screen test, the girl elected Oregon's Victory War Bond Queen will win a war bond citation from the Hollywood War Activities Committee, a "date" with her favorite movie star and visits to the major motion picture studios.

County and state finals will judge candidates 75 percent for war bond purchases they represent and 25 percent for queenlike qualities: charm, poise, personality and natural beauty.

A system of checks and balances will equalize competition between small and large community candidates in judging the 75 percent for war bonds. Any girl, consequently, who becomes an official nominee for the queenship of her town or city will have a good chance to become Oregon's war bond queen.

Official nomination will be gained by representing a minimum of \$5,000, so queen aspirants and groups planning to back a queen are advised to save official ballots as soon as possible after the contest officially opens November 5.

Road Contract Let Around South Rim Of Dorena Reservoir

Saturday the county court at Eugene received a copy of the contract for the construction of a road around the south rim of the proposed Dorena reservoir by the U. S. Engineers. Part of the construction has been started and when completed the road will be between five and six miles. The county will furnish the right of way. The contract also provides a right of way for Cottage Grove to lay the city mains, which necessitates laying of a new line since the present line will be covered by water.

Dr. Victor Morris Addresses Lions On Post War Problems

Dr. Victor P. Morris of Eugene with the University of Oregon business administration brought an interesting message to members of the Cottage Grove Lions club last Thursday on problems of the post-war employment. According to Dr. Morris the term 60 million jobs for Americans has been rather loosely used. "We still don't know under this proposal what hours the laborer will work, what age limits will be proposed or the part that women will play in industry to establish a standard of living we hope to obtain, or how many bread winners will be working in the family. In some families there will be one while in others two. This eventually may affect the standard of living in many families."

Dr. Morris foresees a five-day week for industry and a return to the government aid, if private enterprise fails to provide the necessary jobs. The worst thing about government aid is that at the end of the year we are back where we started and it's all to do over again, according to Dr. Morris, who asserts that the nation has reached a point where it will not see anybody suffer even if it does mean the return government as such as was witnessed in the 1930s.

He further foresees an era of prosperity for the next few years, except possibly a slight letdown in the adjustment period.

Two or three industries or professions can be made to supply an increasing number of jobs and two of the most promising of these are travel which requires the services of a large number of people, and health service, which can also be made to employ an increasing number of people.

Mrs. Mary Michel Girl Scout Officer Address Group Here

Mrs. Mary Michel, executive secretary of the Eugene Girl Scout Council, spoke to a group of Girl Scout mothers, troop committee members and leaders in the Jefferson auditorium last Monday evening. In her talk Mrs. Michel stressed the ways the mothers could aid the leaders, the duties and responsibilities of the troop committees, and "planted seeds of thought" for projects and plans in the future. Mrs. Michel stated that no leader can be expected to excel in all ten of the program fields used in Girl Scouting and it is only through unified adult backing that a progressive Scouting program can be maintained. She also emphasized the opportunities offered at Camp Clewcox, where Girl Scouts gather for fun and training each summer.

A leaders training course has been announced for November 12 at the Congregational Church Parish House in Eugene from 7:30 to 9:30. This will be the beginning of a series of four leaders meetings.

Saturday, November 3, brings Girl Scout week to a close with a coast-to-coast radio hookup on the National Broadcasting stations from 6:00 to 6:30 o'clock with a program entitled "Girl Scouts' Own Show." Taking part in this broadcast will be Earl Warren, governor of California, Elizabeth Taylor and Dinah Shore.

It is hoped that Cottage Grove Girl Scouts will hold "family listening parties" and enjoy this program.

Lt. Col. J. A. Pironi Explains New Set-up For National Guards

Lt. Col. J. A. Pironi, OMC AUS, state property and fiscal officer of the state guard at Salem was a guest speaker at the luncheon program of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday and told of some of the tentative plans for reorganization of the national guard, which will play an increasing part in supplying military training during the post war period. As soon as the national guard is organized here under the new set-up, the state guard will be inactivated.

The speaker said the national guard was the first line unit of our military department, its mission is to provide a reserve for the army and to provide an organization to supply strength for the preservation of property etc., in the same manner as the regular army.

The local guard unit will probably become a heavy anti-aircraft organization. Physical examinations for enlistment will be a requirement the same as in the regular army. Blanks for enlistments will be supplied Capt. Bukowski of the state guard. Enlistments will be for a period of three years. State guard members are eligible to enlist and the state guard may be organized into a national guard as soon as the enlistment strength is sufficient.

Other highlights of the speaker's remarks were that the post war national guard would be enlarged and to be more liberal in terms to the enlisted men as well as more liberal in supplies. The enlistment men will be required to drill for two hours instead of the 1 1/2 hours and will receive the same pay as the enlisted soldier.

Following the address of Col. Pironi, Capt. Bukowski announced that the army was opened to the various organizations for entertainment and that such entertainment could be arranged provided that there were no conflicts. Four organizations are using the armory now, he said.

Edwin E. Cone Dies Suddenly Friday a.m.

Edwin Earl Cone, 61, well known lumber operator, died at his home at 1226 South Fourth street early Friday morning following a heart attack. His sudden passing was a distinct shock to members and friends of the family. He was born September 3, 1884 at Beloit, Kansas and was married September 30, 1912 to Louise Zeigler at Portland.

Mr. Cone, who operated the Cone Lumber Co., at Goshen, had been a resident of Cottage Grove since 1924. He had lived in Oregon since he was four years old.

Funeral services were held from the Mills mortuary at 10:30 a.m. Monday with the Rev. Frank E. Brown, officiating. Interment was in the Masonic-IOOF cemetery.

Surviving are his widow, a son Edwin E. Cone of Eugene and a daughter, Marjorie Cone, at home; three brothers, Ransom Cone of Cottage Grove, and Clarence and Raymond Cone, both of Portland, and a sister, Mrs. Will Yost of Eugene.

He was a member of the Methodist church.

Sutherland and Lynx Hollow Men Win Big Buck Prizes

A Sutherland and a Lynx Hollow resident won the annual prizes offered by the Quality Market here, it was announced yesterday. Harvey Richey won a \$10.00 cash prize for the biggest mule deer killed during the season, which ended Sunday. The buck weighed 203 pounds. A VanProoyen of Route 1, Creswell took the \$10.00 prize offered for the biggest blacktail buck with an animal that weighed 182 pounds.

Approximately 60 deer were weighed in at the Quality Market and according to conservative estimates about 100 bucks were killed during the season by residents of this area.

National War Fund Campaign Bogs Down Third Quota Raised

The Lane county national war fund was badly lagging yesterday on the day that the campaign was scheduled to have been closed with only about a third of the local goal reached. Damon Scott reported that the collections at that time reached a total of \$2,066.68 against a south Lane goal of \$6,400. While most of the campaign in the city limits has been finished, reports from some of the rural districts have not been received and the drive particularly among the mills appears to be bogging down.

The campaign in other parts of the county is faring better with a county total of \$79,816 reported in Tuesday, which was 70 percent of the \$118,000 goal.

Lions Capture Tri- County League Lead

The Cottage Grove Lions captured the Tri-County league lead last Friday by defeating a tough Roseburg team 21-0.

Coach Dusenberry's charges, led by the Lions' driving fullback, Noel Campbell, who scored all three touchdowns for the Lions, rolled up 290 net yards and 15 first downs to the Indians' 80 net yards and 8 first downs.

The Lions, in their usual manor, scored early in the first period to get the jump on a bewildered Indian eleven. The Indians received the kickoff but found the C. G. line too tough and were forced to kick on third down. The Lions promptly started a drive that climaxed when Noel Campbell circled his right end and ran 40 yards for the touchdown. Newton ran left end for the conversion.

The first period ended 7-0 for the Lions.

The Grovers scored again rather late in the second quarter to give the Lions a 14-0 halftime lead.

After a drive starting at mid-field Campbell scored around his left end from the two-yard line. Neideigh drove over left tackle for the conversion.

The third quarter saw no scoring. Both teams threatened but neither was able to score. The Lions stalled on the four yard line and the Indians had a blocked pass intercepted on the ten.

Late in the final frame the Lions found their pace again. Taking the ball on their own 40, a pass from Neideigh to Mickey netted 11 yards and a first down. Two ground plays failed and the Lions took to the air again, this time netting 20 yards on a pass from Campbell to Mickey. On the next play Noel Campbell crashed over center for 30 yards and the final touchdown. Newton went over left tackle for the conversion, bringing the score to 21-0 for the Lions.

This victory puts the Lions in the running for the state championship playoffs.

News Briefs of Local Interest Here and There

Destructive Halloween

Last night pranksters had a field day over town and as reports come in the Halloween stunts may prove to be the most expensive seen here in a good many years. Police report that about 75 percent of the street lights were destroyed by boys using a rifle, sling shots and air rifles. Several streets were blocked by parked trailers and in one particular instance police worked for an hour and a half trying to move a logging trailer which pranksters had locked. The swinging bridge over the Coast Fork back of First street is down in the river after the wire cables were cut.

An out house was moved to the highway at the street intersection at 9th and Main and with a bunch of old tires was burned. The tires are still burning this morning. Two boys were fined for exceeding the speed limit on Main street, one was alleged to have been driving at the rate of 60 miles per hour.

In addition today will be the annual window washing day in Cottage Grove. No business house escaped being either soaped or parafined.

Naval Academy Appointments

Four candidates from Lane county were named this week by Congressman Harris Ellsworth for the U. S. Naval and military academies. Appointments were made on the basis of competitive examinations to be given in July. To the naval academy: Wm. T. Peckham of Swiss Home, Bruce M. Keller of Eugene and Herold W. White of Marcola as second and third alternates, John P. Byrne of Eugene was named principal for the U. S. military academy.

Lumber Strike End Seen

Some cause for optimism as to the end of the lumber strike was seen yesterday in Portland when the announcement from E. P. Marsh, conciliator, that he would have labor and management around the conference table within a week. Both labor and management were studying President Truman's speech made public Tuesday.

Farm Income Down

A decline of as much as 15 percent in the net income of farmers for 1946 was forecast yesterday by the department of agriculture. Demand, however, for farm products will remain high through the year, the department said.

Zoning and Building Code Enforcement Discussed Friday

Zoning and enforcement of the building code were discussed at a citizen's meeting held in the council chambers of the city hall Friday evening. A resolution placed before the group, asking that the provisions of the building code be enforced in the city limits was passed and unanimously approved by the group.

It was agreed that the matter of zoning the city properly would require planning and study, but that zoning should be undertaken here to avert an ill after-effect of a building boom, which might develop here after conditions return to normal.

It was also agreed that the forced, would be protection for the property owner and that if building code provisions, if enacted, a more understanding attitude can be expected on the part of the property owner.

Objection was also raised to prospects of scattering the federal housing units promiscuously over town, now that the housing project has been abandoned on the west side high school grounds. The objection raised was that the units were classed as a temporary housing setup only.

Commenting on the prospects of zoning, Dr. H. A. Hagen, mayor, announced that the city planning commission would meet tonight with two representatives of the League of Oregon Cities to discuss zoning procedure.
