Hog Numbers Trend Upward - 1946 Pig Goal About Same

Current hog slaughter under federal inspection is near the low of record, yet the number of hogs in the United States on January 1 this year was 28 percent above the 1935-1939 average. Preliminary estimates indicate some increase in the number of hogs in the country next January 1.

The goal for the 1946 spring crop is about equal the spring pig crop of 1945, however. Effective October 1, 1946, to September 30, 1947, the support price Chicago basis is to average \$12. That is compared with \$13 at present and until next September 30.

Although the average support for the year ending September 30, 1947, is to be \$12, there will be seasonal adjustments according to normal seasonal changes in hog prices. For example, the support prices in December, 1946, is to be \$10.75 at Chicago and \$13.25 in September, 1947. There will also be regional differentials above and below the Chicago basis. These seasonal and regional adjustments are intended to encourage more normal hog production.

The support price is intended to reflect 90 percent of the expected parity price. As of September 15 the parity price for hogs was \$12.60, but the actual national average price to farmers was \$14.10 or 112 percent of parity.

Consumer demand and purchasing power is so strong that terminal market prices have held firmly at the ceilings. The average farm price of hogs in Oregon at mid-September was \$14.90. That compares with \$8.60 as the 1935-1939 average.

Total meat production in 1946 and in 1947 is expected to be about as large as this year, if hog production holds in line with the

goals. If the supply is not too great in relation to the demand, hog prices may average even higher than the support price.

POINTS ON FATS REDUCED

Butter, margarine, lard, shortening and oils was reduced four points a pound from 12 points, their present value, to 8 points, and point values of six for fatty pork cuts that are a source of lard, and of one ready-to-eat meat also will be lower during the rationing period beginning October 28 and ending December 1, Willard F. Case, OPA Food Specialist said yesterday.

NOVEMBER TIRE QUOTA SAME

Passenger tire and large size truck tire quotas for November will be the same as for October—2,500,000 for passenger cars and 250,000 for trucks—the War Production Board and the Office of Price Administration announced today, according to information given out by J. R. Kefer, OPA district tire rationing representative.

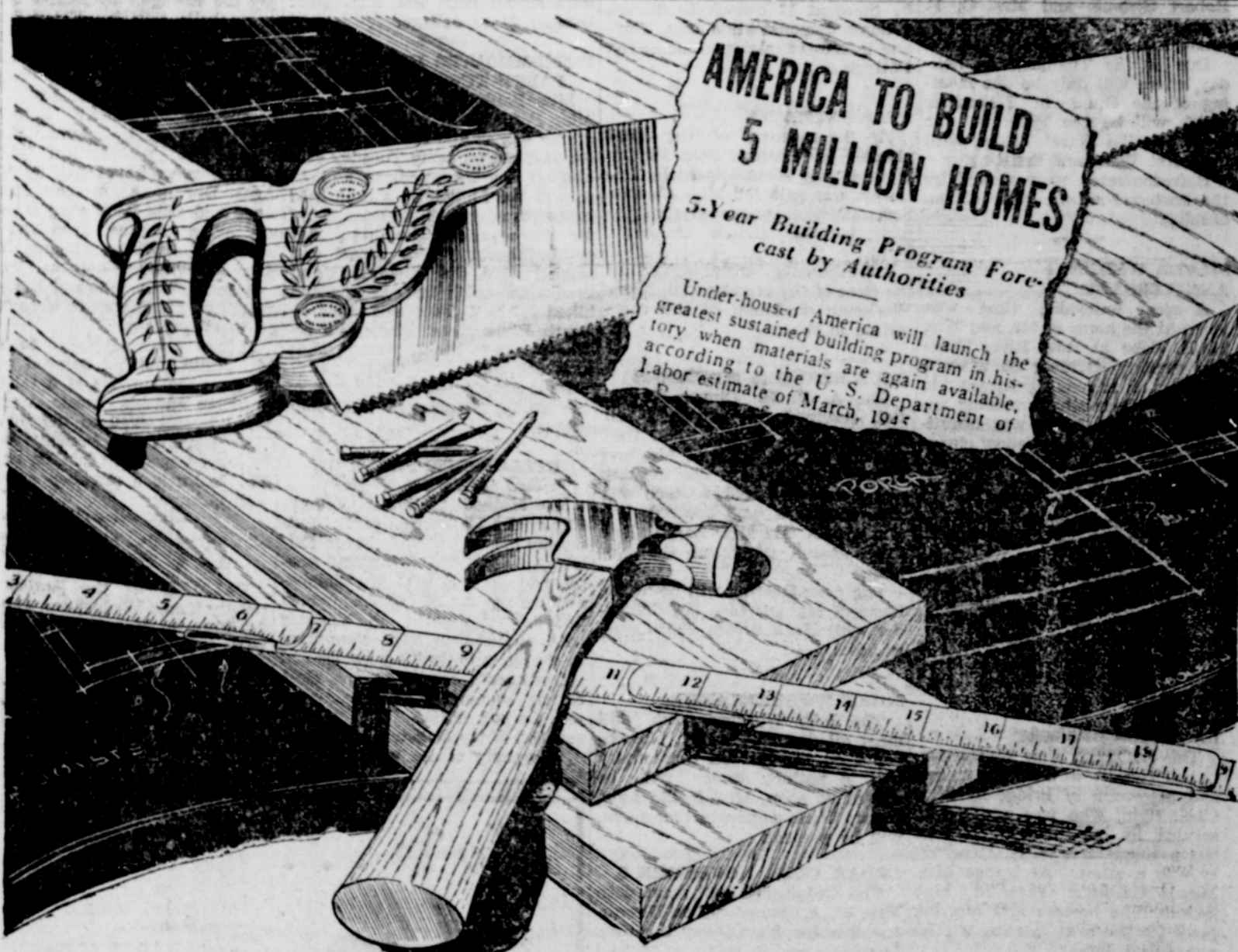
