STATE EGG OUTPUT DOWN

PORTLAND, Ore.—A drop of one-million eggs in Oregon production during September as compared to the same month a year ago, was reported by the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics. The September total was 29,000,000 eggs, indicating a rate of production slightly above the pre-war level. The 10-year average production for the month is 28,000,000. Figures for the first nine months of 1945 showed production of 388,000,000 eggs, a drop of 7 percent for the same period a year ago but 11 percent above the 10-year average.

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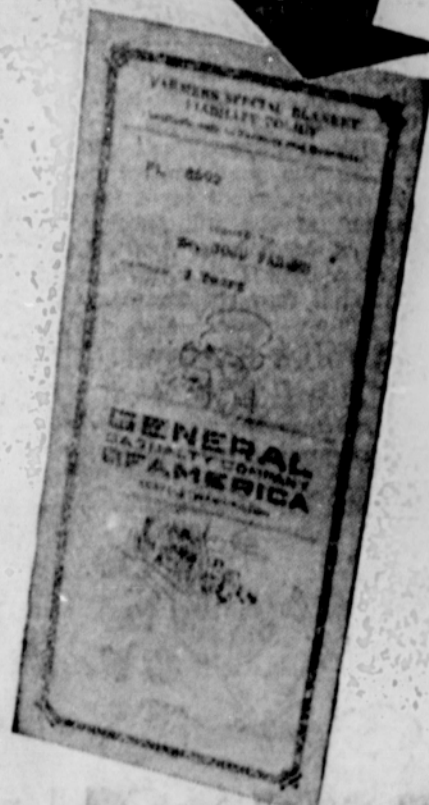
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
