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REMOTE CONTROL

It seems we are approaching or have arrived at the period when we expect our business, our profession, sometimes our job and politics to be operated by remote control.

We have been told very frankly that the reason the bureaucracy has grown so in Washington is that every nook and hamlet in the nation has taken its troubles directly to the national capitol instead of trying to solve our own problems at home. In doing this the public has taken what appears to be the easiest way out, but a costly way nevertheless. The main trouble is that our problem is likely to be put up to some bureau head that thinks the Mississippi river is the western boundary of the United States. Some shining examples of mismanagement pulled by the OPA clearly illustrates the fact that the chief who makes the rules knows nothing of the local problems and some times seems to care less.

Big business has made some of the same mistakes in centralizing authority and now labor it seems may be following the same course. The public will be interested in the outcome of the strike situation at Salem where a labor unit has asked the privilege of negotiating its own contract with a lumber mill and whether or not higher up union officials will permit such a contract.

BRASS HAT ARISTOCRACY

One of the main objections to any sort of compulsory military training in this nation stems from the aristocracy of the Washington brass hats or big wigs. Of course there are lots of lesser lights who would build a military aristocracy, but the Prussian generals of Germany would not have much on us, if the brass hats had their way.

Worst of all, a good many of the would-be military top notches are reluctant to admit that scientific improvements in armaments had anything to do with winning the war. They have not got around to admitting that the atomic bomb was a decisive factor in beating Japan.

To preserve the peace, if this is to be done by the army would be to drill into the heads of some of the old timers that time brings changes in war as well as peace and that at the Mignot line was outmoded with the first world war.

JUST ANOTHER INCIDENT

A few months ago there was a nationwide furor over the bureaucratic shortcomings of the Veterans' Administration. Shamefully inadequate and obsolete practices were exposed in the veterans' hospitals. But the rush of events quickly pushed the incident onto the back pages. And, like many such incidents, the public has heard no more.

Here is a typical illustration of what would happen if the whole country should be included in a politically administered medical system. Individuals would be subjected, as the veterans were and perhaps still are, to questionable or incompetent care. As individuals, they could do nothing more than vent their displeasure. Trying to ferret out officials responsible for ill treatment would be akin to grappling with your shadow. When the situation became bad enough, a rash of condemnation would appear in the press. Investigations would be promised—as they were in the case of the Veterans' Administration—a few of the most glaring faults would be corrected, and then the evil system would settle down for another twenty years or so of dozing dogma and inefficiency.

This is no exaggeration. It is what would be faced by the people if they permit state or socialized medicine, whichever you wish to call it, to settle upon the country. It is the normal procedure of bureaucracy.

Dealers To Handle
A.A.A. Materials
Under New Method

The purchase order method of distributing conservation materials to Oregon farmers has been inaugurated for 1946, with "fair prices" for superphosphate approved for eight Oregon counties, R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state AAA committee, has announced.

The purchase order plan, Taylor explained, replaces direct distribution by county agricultural conservation associations of phosphate shipped in from plants under contract to AAA. Through the contract plan, since 1939, 10,650 tons of treble phosphate and 22-100 tons of superphosphate have been distributed to Oregon farmers for use on soil-conserving crops.

Next year in counties where the new plan is approved, farmers will obtain their conservation material phosphate from dealers instead of from the county association. Under this plan a farmer will obtain a purchase order in the amount of his expected practice payment for applying the phosphate. He will take the order to a dealer, take delivery of the phosphate, and pay the dealer the difference between the amount of the purchase order and the established fair price for the county, or the amount of the order and the dealer's price if it is less than the fair price.

Fair prices set for the following counties are Clackamas, Marion, Polk, and Benton, \$31.00 a ton, warehouse delivery; Crook and Deschutes counties, \$29.50 a ton, rail siding delivery; Tillamook county, \$32.90 a ton, rail siding delivery; and Jackson county, \$34.60 a ton, rail siding. Establishment of fair prices for all other counties is under consideration.

Steel Output

In the past four years, output of this country's steel mills totaled 225 million tons—double the rest of the world's production in any two years before the war began. Actual production last year amounted to 89.1 million tons, 70 per cent more than Axis Europe combined with Japan was able to make.
